ANOTHER WRECK AT YAQUINA.

The Schooner Rowena Drifts Onto the
Breakers of South Beach.

(Special to the Capital Journal.)
YAQUINA CITY, Or., Aug. 30.—
The little schooner "Rowena" of
Tillamook, returning to Yaquina to-
day from deep sea fishing, sailed too
close to shore and got in the breakers
on South Beach near Newport and
drifted on shore. All hands were
saved, but the schooner will prove a
loss.

The Civil Service Denounced.

BALTIMORE, Aug. 29.—Last night
the federation of republican clubs
of the third congressional district,
which represents twenty-three as-
sociations, adopted the following:

Resolved, That we, as republic-
ans, pledge ourselves not to sup-
port anyone for office, either na-
tional, state or city, who is in favor
of the present odious civil service, or
its application in the distribution of
public patronage, whereby the ma-
jority of appointments are awarded
to young men fresh from schools
and colleges, while the active, intel-
ligent, educated and deserving men
of our own party are barred out on
account of age, or have failed to
answer foolish questions, not perti-
nent to the service in which they
are seeking employment.

The Cronin Murderers.

CHICAGO, Aug. 29.—Judge Mc-
Connell this morning decided that
all the defendants in the Cronin
trial should be tried together, with
the exception of Frank Woodruff,
the young Californian. Judge Mc-
Connell said that in view of Wood-
ruff's confessions it would be man-
ifestly unfair to allow him to go to
trial with the others.

All the defendants took exceptions
to the ruling against the separate
trial and were given twenty days to
file bills of exceptions. All then
said they were ready for trial.

Escape of a Seized Sealer.

VICTORIA, B. C., Aug. 29.—The
British schooner "Junata," which
was seized by the "Rush" and or-
dered to Ounakana as a prize, arrived
here to-night, having disregarded
the orders of the American captain.
There was no prize crew on board.
It is generally believed that every
schooner seized will come here.

Returned With a Message.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 29.—George
T. Marsh, a curio merchant of this
city, who sailed for Japan on the
Arable last Thursday took three
pigeons with him, with the object,
not only of testing their endurance
but also settling the point of whether
a carrier dove would fly over a great
expanse of water. Tuesday night
one of these doves returned to this
city. Securely fastened to its leg
was a message from Mr. Marsh. It
is thought that the pigeon was let
loose when the steamer was about a
thousand miles out to sea.

CONDENSED DISPATCHES.

The human line steamer City of
New York won the ocean race.

The big hotel at Portland will be
ready to receive guests by the first
of January.

The senate committee on irrigation
are visiting California towns to se-
cure information on the subject they
are investigating.

The King of Siam has donated
for the use of the Presbyterian mis-
sion one of the royal palaces, to-
gether with the extensive grounds
and buildings.

Forest fires near Helena, Montana,
are raging and the city is enveloped
in smoke. A large fire is also burn-
ing over an extensive area of farm
and ranch land north of the fair
grounds.

otherwise uninjured.

LONDON, Aug. 29.—If New York
wants the tallest tower in the world
it will be necessary to enlarge such
plans as have been discussed, as
London is pretty certain to have a
tower 2000 feet high. The projected
London tower is assuming definite
shape and form in the minds of the
promoters. Perks, solicitor to the
company, sees it an accomplished
fact, so enthusiastic and confident is
he over the enterprise. He antici-
pates no difficulty that will not be
overcome by negotiations, and as a
financial speculation he thinks it
will be a successful venture.

Pennsylvania Prohibitionists.

HARRISBURG, Aug. 28.—The
prohibitionists nominated J. R.
Johnson for state treasurer. The
platform declares for the Australian
system of voting and female suff-
rage on a proper educational basis.

Sold to Huntington.

LONDON, Aug. 29.—A meeting of
the bondholders of the Oregonian
railway company was held to-day
at the office of the company in Dun-
dee, Scotland. By a unanimous
vote the sale of the railroad to C. P.
Huntington for £100,000 was ap-
proved. The company had lost at
the rate £200 weekly in interest,
and desired to consummate the sale
as rapidly as possible.

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
