The City Assessment.

The city assessment has been returned and shows the net valuation of the city for taxation to be \$1,655,149. Of the list eighty individual tax payers represent \$955,111, or over one-half of the whole assessment. Of this number ten firms or individuals pay over one-third of the whole, \$378,863. The ten heaviest taxpayers are: Wm. Stewart, \$101,940; Ladd & Bush, \$90,000; R. S. Wallace, \$42,800; Breyman Bros., \$29,395; G. W. Gray, \$27,420; Southern Pacific R. R. Co., \$21,500; Salem water company, \$20,000; Salem flour mills, \$15,000; George H. Turner, \$15,000; J. M. Rosenberg & Co., \$14,808.

A HIGHWAY ROBBERY!

Frank Albaugh Held Up and Robbed of \$1,100.

THE NOTED JAMES BOYS OUTDONE!

They Shoot Their Victim After Getting His Wealth.

Warren Cranston arrived in Salem at noon to-day and brought the news of a bold highway robbery perpetrated last evening out on Drift creek, near Silverton. Frank Albaugh, who lives southeast of Salem on the Turner road, was the victim, he having been stood up by bold highwaymen and relieved of a purse containing \$1,100.

THE LONE HIGHWAYMEN.

Mr. Albaugh is a farmer, having but recently purchased a large farm of M. L. Chamberlin on the Turner road. He sold his wheat and had to go to Silverton to receive pay for it—the wheat having been shipped there via the narrow gauge. Yesterday afternoon Mr. Albaugh went to Silverton to get the money for his wheat. There was \$1,100 due him and he unwisely took pay in money, rather than deposit it, and started for home on horseback, carrying the money with him.

Night was coming on and by the time he arrived at Drift creek, a few miles out of Silverton, it was dusk. Unwarned and little thinking what might be in store for him he crossed the Drift creek bridge, when a man stepped from the brush and leveling a revolver at the head of Mr. Albaugh gave the command, "HOLD UP YOUR HANDS!"

Mr. Albaugh was quick to respond, when a second man stepped up behind him and requested him to fork over his wealth. There was nothing to do but to submit and this he did gracefully, and the robbers seemed to gloat over the success of their daring venture. Robber No. 1 continued to keep the revolver pointed with deadly aim at the head of Albaugh, who rather disliked the accuracy of the aim. After they had put the money away the man with drawn pistol told Albaugh he "had a good notion to shoot him any way."

ALBAUGH WOUNDED.

At this the robber moved as if to fire and Albaugh grabbed for the pistol and received the charge in his hand, making a most painful wound. A second shot was fired, but fortunately struck a watch which was in his vest pocket. The ball glanced off, but dented the watch. The shot no doubt would have been fatal had it not struck the watch.

THE ROBBERS ESCAPE.

After firing the second shot the robbers and would-be murderers disappeared in the forest and made good their escape. Mr. Albaugh proceeded on his way home, telling the neighbors of the robbery, but no chase could be made. Night had spread her sable mantle and the gathering darkness precluded the robbers being followed.

The men are described as medium sized and about thirty or thirty-five years of age, but it was not learned how they were dressed or if they wore masks. Deputy Sheriff Wrightman started in search of them this afternoon but as they have so many hours' head start of him they will in all probability never be apprehended.

Oregon Sweet Potatoes.

George Whitaker to-day brought in to Weller Bros. store a fine lot of sweet potatoes that he raised on Government island, south west of Salem. They are quite large and very delicious, having a fresher taste than the imported potatoes. It is hoped that the raising of these potatoes will increase until the Salem market can be supplied with tubers for home consumption.

It Came Too Late.

The telegraph yesterday announced that after years and years of delay a long deserved pension had been granted to Erasmus Kidder of Oregon. The old soldier's benefit arrived too late, he having crossed to the great beyond two months ago. The deceased was a citizen of Marion county and had struggled on for years striving to get the pension that was justly due him. His was a worthy claim but his summons arrived and found his pension claim neglected.

The Streets Barred.

(Correspondence of the Capital Journal.) I notice in a recent number of your paper you criticize the way in which Commercial street is blocked and has been nearly all summer just on account of a brick building or two. Why this delay? Why should this nuisance still exist in the capital city? Still there is another nuisance in the city in which many citizens of Salem are interested and more especially those who live on High street. It seems to us that the proprietors of the agricultural works are going to make a lumber yard of the public street near their building. Several thousand feet of lumber is now, and has been lying there for months with just room enough for one to pass. Besides it obstructs the view of one of the prettiest streets in the city. We see no reason why any one will assume the prerogative of appropriating public property to individual use without any authority from anyone. We, as citizens of Salem and residents on High street, demand the removal of that huge pile of lumber to where it belongs. This street is public property and no one has a right to appropriate its use to individual ends. It must be removed if a petition to the city council is resorted to.
