A NEW MANUFACTURE.—Dorance Bros., who have a saw mill situated a few miles northeast of Salem, have purchased a block of land on the river slough, southwest of the Salem Flouring mills, and work will commence immediately on the construction of a large saw mill, with a capacity of 50,000 feet per day. A planing mill will be run in connection with the saw mill. The engine will be a 150 horse power, and the cost of the whole investment will be about \$50,000. Dorance Bros. are first-class gentlemen and will conduct a good mill. Mr. D. W. Dorance left to-day for the Santiam where he goes for the purpose of purchasing timber. Mr. Dorance will ship the logs to this city on the train during the summer and will float them down the river during the winter months when the water is high. Salem needs more manufacturing and especially does she need more lumber mills. There have been thousands and thousands of feet of lumber shipped in here this summer and then several delays were caused by the want of lumber. Hurrah for Salem.

PERFECTED ORGANIZATION.

The Salem Electric Street Car Company Elect Officers and Proceed to Business.

Last evening the Salem Electric Street Car company held a stockholder's meeting in the parlors of Ladd & Bush's bank and perfected organization. The meeting was well attended. A JOURNAL reporter happened in at the meeting and made the following notice:

The meeting was called to order and Rev. P. S. Knight, elected as temporary chairman and Hon. M. L. Chamberlin elected temporary secretary. The chairman stated the object of the meeting, being mainly to perfect organization and proceed to the election of proper officers so that the company could go ahead properly.

Moved by Wm. Gray and seconded by Hon. G. W. Webb that the seven directors be elected by ballot, which resulted in the election of Rev. P. S. Knight, David Simpson, W. T. Gray, Hon. M. L. Chamberlin, O. E. Krause, Hon. G. W. Webb and Louis Kuhn. Immediately after their election they took the oath of office and were sworn in to faithfully discharge their duty, by A. Bush.

Geo. Downing, O. E. Krause and M. L. Chamberlin were appointed a committee of three to draft by-laws to be submitted at the directors' meeting on Thursday evening.

A motion was made that the first meeting of the directors be held immediately after the adjournment of the stockholders' meeting carried. A motion was then made to adjourn until Thursday evening at 7:30; carried.

DIRECTORS' MEETING. Immediately after the stockholders' meeting adjourned, the directors' meeting was called to order with the appointment of Rev. P. S. Knight as temporary chairman and Hon. M. L. Chamberlin as temporary secretary.

The work of building the line will commence in a short time, and the first line will be run on Cheimete street, Commercial to 18th street, thence to State street and then proceed on to the state penitentiary. More particulars will be made public in the JOURNAL at an early date. Property along the proposed line is already advancing in price. A CURIOUS OCCURRENCE.

The Strange Disappearance of a Man in the City Together With the Facts Causes a Sensation.

The two then came down Commercial street to Court street, when they started toward Front street, the stranger was carrying a large valise and the men were talking about where a certain boarding house was, when they were accosted by a strange woman, who stopped them and said:

"Are you looking for a lodging house?"

Mr. Mason answered that he was not, but the gentleman with him was.

The woman said: "I have rooms that I can rent you for \$1 per week."

Mr. Mason said: "Well that is reasonable enough, and I suppose (turning to the stranger), you had better take one of those rooms, and I will go on back to my boarding place."

The stranger consented and started away with the woman, who said she would show him where to go. Saturday morning came, and the stranger failed to appear at the works. Mr. Mason thought probably he had over slept himself and would be around at quartering time, but he failed to show up on Saturday. Monday came and still he failed to put in his appearance, and up to three o'clock this afternoon the stranger has not been seen or heard from since the time he went away with the strange woman on Court street, between Commercial and Front streets, Friday evening about 8 o'clock.
