A PLUCKY WIDOW.

She Forces a Malicious Slanderer to Apologize.

GUTHRIE, O., Oct. 6.—Among the most respected residents of this bustling young city is Mrs. Alice D. Burns, a little widow who came here three months ago, and established herself as a laundress. For some time past a real-estate speculator named Brown has been paying vain court to the widow. Finally, angered at the widow's refusal to marry him, he began to circulate stories derogatory to her character. These stories reached the widow's ears yesterday. She acted promptly.

Arming herself with a heavy revolver, which she carried inside her cloak, she started out in search of Brown, finding him standing on a corner in conversation.

The little widow suddenly appeared in front of her slanderer, at whose chest she leveled her revolver, saying: "Get down on your knees and apologize for the lies you have told about me." The astonished real estate man hesitated, but quickly complied when the widow poked the muzzle within his shirt front.

He dropped to his knees and in his fright began to pray for divine deliverance from his danger, the bystanders meanwhile enjoying the unusual scene to the full.

When Brown recovered himself sufficiently to know what was wanted of him, he made a groveling apology to the widow, who never for a moment took her eyes off him or moved her weapon. Then she turned and quickly walked home.

Brown was so unmercifully grieved about the affair that he left by the earliest train for the east.

ADDITIONAL CITY NEWS.

A CHEESE CASE.—Quite a sensational arrest was made out beyond the depot this morning by Deputy Sheriff Savage. Sometime ago Fred Luthy started a cheese factory at Stayton, and as he was rather pushed in financial matters, the good farmers in that section agreed to sell him milk with the understanding that he was to pay for same when the cheese were sold. He made quite a number of cheese and was selling it. The farmers thought he was not doing the right thing with them. About a month ago he moved to Salem and started a boarding house. Two weeks ago J. W. Thomas and C. W. Thomas decided that all was not right, and sued Luthy for \$450.80 due them for milk and obtained judgment. They then attached his goods in the cheese factory, about three miles east of Stayton, and stowed them away in a cellar, belonging to J. W. Thomas, about three miles east of Stayton. Nothing went wrong until this morning, when J. W. Thomas went to salt the cheese, which he is required to do every other day and to his great surprise found that the cellar had been broken into and a load of cheese stolen. He at once went to Stayton, notified Constable J. P. Thomas, who set out for Turner on trace of the stolen property. When he reached Turner he learned that the parties had passed through there and for fear he would not catch them he telegraphed Sheriff Croisan, who at once sent Mr. Savage to meet the gentles. He captured them just beyond the depot and promptly arrested them. They proved to be F. Buech a brother-in-law of Mr. Luthy. Buech claims to have a bill of sale from Luthy, and Alplanalp was only hired to haul the cheese. They were arranged before Justice Chase and lodged in the county jail until tomorrow for trial. They went to the cellar at 3 o'clock this morning, it seems, and loaded up forty or fifty cheese, and started to the city with the above results.
