While the weather, during the past week, has not been very favorable toward the society world, yet, not a few most pleasant events have occurred which are noted in the columns of the CAPITAL JOURNAL to-day.

Society events have started out this fall under pleasing prospects for a splendid season's pleasant social happenings. In hopes that the following from a New York paper, regarding new dances of the season, may prove of interest to readers of the CAPITAL JOURNAL, we give it place.

One of the new things for the ball room is Le Reve. This dance, as its name implies, is dreamy to a degree. It is, of course, a round dance, as the waltz still reigns supreme, as it doubtless always will. The movements in this dance are essentially voluptuous, and with dreamy music the dancers may glide along into soulful bliss to their hearts' content. It starts off with three glides, the last made slowly to a bewitchingly sweet half-measure note from the orchestra. Then there follows a coupe or thrusting forward of the foot and recovering it immediately behind the other foot. After that is the jete, or delicious little money jump with the forward foot, at the same time bringing the other foot to a position of rest. This position of rest is technically termed the assemblée. That is all there is to it, and the dreamy dancers go on gliding and gliding, now and then giving the suspicion of a delicate little leap, as if the ecstasy were just too ravishing to endure without some manifestation of the "too utterly utter."

Some of the other new dances which are expected to attain a due measure of popularity are "Les Caprices Double," the "Esmeralda," the "York," the "Gavotte," the "Military Schottische," the "Berlin," the "Duchess," the "M. Mary Polk," the "Octagon" and the "Diamond." These last two belong to the category of square dances, though the "Octagon," as its name indicates, is danced with the couples arranged in octagonal form. It requires sixteen persons to dance it. It is unnecessary here to describe the various movements and figures, as they bear a general resemblance to the old square dances, with the addition of extra figures and more complicated movement. The military schottische is destined, probably, to a reasonably long life. It is a quadrille danced entirely with the steps of the schottische, and its newness consists in the application of schottische steps to the square dance. The movement is comparatively slow, three beats to a measure, and the tout ensemble of the dance is picturesque.

One of the most enjoyable events of the season thus far occurred on Wednesday evening, Oct. 10, at the handsome parlors of the Chevreton hotel, in honor of Mrs. Wm. Figgis, (nee Miss Daisy Taylor), of Moscow, Idaho. Mr. and Mrs. Figgis has been the esteemed guests of Mrs. W. S.
