FACTS ABOUT CIGARETTES.

During last year the collections of

internal revenue from cigarettes

alone amounted to considerable over

a million dollars. The increase of

the consumption of these deadly

small articles since the year before

is sufficiently startling. The added

revenue from them for the year end-

ing June 30, 1899, was \$144,467.63.

cigarettes this increase implies.

During last year the boys, young

men and a few women and old men

consumed 2,515,515,390 of these little

paper rolls. As far as that is con-

cerned there are boys not yet grown

who sometimes smoke as many as

sixty cigarettes in a day. The plain

A Railroad on Trees.

According to a California newspaper there is, in Sonoma county, a very peculiar railroad. In the middle of the yawning ravine stand two large redwood trees which compose a substantial trestle and are sawed off seventy-five feet from the ground.
