HOMES.

The following from the Tacoma Globe strikes forcibly in Salem and the JOURNAL reprints it: Tacoma today has a population of not less than 40,000 souls, and each month brings astonishing numbers in addition. Never in the history of this great northwest have the workmen of any city had such grand opportunities for saving their money and building homes for themselves as in this city.

Every corporation, mill, foundry, machine shop and manufactory, of whatever kind, should most heartily encourage the laboring man to have his own house and lots; some place that he can call his own; his home. The workmen as a class own their own homes in Philadelphia, and that city has twice as many dwelling houses as any other city in the world, according to population.

The anarchists and agitators find but few dupes among men who have their own homes, as has been demonstrated, and the man with his home forms a worthy part of the large aggregate of property in a great community.

There are 20,000 laboring men in Philadelphia, who hold \$50,000,000 worth of homes.

Out of 485,000 families in the little Alpine republic of Switzerland, 463,000 are householders, and therein lies the great secret of the patriotism and prosperity of that people, who have defied tyrants and hurled monarchs from their thrones.

With the encouragement of the schools of art, schools for manual training, free public reading rooms and libraries, great universities, and good government, the country flourishes, but before them all we must cultivate and encourage the acquisition of happy and contented homes. This will prove discouragement to useless strikes, and drive anarchism back to the father of lies, from whence it came, and will make America all we hope and expect in the increase of freedom and enlightenment.
