HAVE INCORPORATED.—The Salem Building and Loan Association have filed articles of incorporation with the secretary of state and the county clerk of Marion county; the incorporators are H. J. Minthorn, Thos. Kay, J. H. Albert, H. V. Matthews and O. M. Smith. The advantages of such an association were set forth in yesterday's Journal, and it is needless to say that the enterprise will meet with flattering success. The capital stock is placed at \$200,000 and places the par value of each share at \$200. Salem needs just such an institution, and many there are in the city who will be only too glad to take advantage of the splendid opportunities as set forth by the company.

THE GRAND JURY DISCHARGED.

Have Finished Their Work and Make a Report—Recommendations Offered—Various Remarks.

To the Honorable the Circuit Court of the State of Oregon, for the County of Marion.

The Grand Jury for the October term of 1889, beg leave to submit the following report:

We have completed our labors and investigated all matters submitted to us.

We have examined into the condition of the county jail and management thereof and find everything connected therewith in good condition.

At the court house and the several offices connected therewith are neatly kept and the records and books, so far as we were able to discover, are in order. We find that the sheriff's office is conducted in an orderly manner and especially in the collection of the delinquent tax, which we find to be reduced to \$819.93.

The discipline at the penitentiary we find to be exceptionally good. The convicts seem to be contented with the treatment received. The records are kept in a neat and systematic manner. We find that the floor and elevator in the chapel are greatly out of repair and recommend that they be replaced by new ones. We also find that there is an insufficiency in the number of guards in the stove works, and we recommend that a larger number be placed therein. We also recommend a better system of lighting the penitentiary, as the lights now in use do not give satisfaction.

At the insane asylum everything is neat, clean and orderly and there is great credit due the management in the manner their records and books are kept.

The county poor house and farm is well kept and the inmates claim that they are well fed and cared for. The water tank is of insufficient strength and recommend that it be strengthened without unnecessary delay.

The capital building and the several offices connected therewith are all in good order and the records well and neatly kept by the several state officers.

We have also visited the deaf mute school and institute for the blind, and from appearances, all are well kept.

In all the above visits, we have found the officers in charge to be courteous and obliging. This is all we have to report, and respectfully ask to be discharged.

A SANTIAM COAL MINE.—Mr. A. T. Powell, of Seio, was in the city yesterday, and left at this office some fine specimens of coal taken from the head of Beaver creek on the Santiam, says the Herald. A well developed coal vein has been found, and a force of men are now at work developing it. It has been named the Morehead Coal Mine and promises to prove valuable. The coal taken out is pronounced by coal experts to be of fine quality. Mr. Powell says the mine will be developed at once, and its extent fully determined. If it is as large a deposit as the surface of the vein indicates it is likely to prove a bonanza, as the quality of the coal is unquestionably good.

MORE TRAINS NEEDED.—Said a railroad man to an Oregonian reporter yesterday: "I see that General Manager Towne, of the Southern Pacific, says that the company will not put another daily train on the Portland-San Francisco run until it fills the one it is running now. It may be that there is not need for another through train, but there is need of increased local service. The through train that leaves East Portland every evening consists of from twelve to fifteen cars, and many people, unable to obtain seats have to stand up until the train reaches Salem. The value of this may be seen in the fact that the drawing capacity of the ordinary locomotive is about eight cars."

GOOD FOR CROISAN.—Marion county has one official she can feel justly proud of and that is Sheriff E. M. Croisan. He is a diligent worker and closely attends to his duties. He has reduced the delinquent tax list until there now remains only the small sum of \$893.93. Lower than it was ever known before. In August Mr. Croisan paid the county treasurer \$1500 and the small sum remaining will probably never be lowered as many have moved away who owe poll tax and the like that will never be collectable.

STREET RAILWAYS.

The Center Street Extension Begun—Contract to be Let Soon on the Electric and Motor Line.

Monday morning a force of workmen began the grading of the Center street extension of the Salem Street Railway line, and to-day the grade for the first block is almost ready for the rails. The iron has been ordered from Pennsylvania, and is due here sometime the coming week. This company intend having the Center street extension in full operation inside of 30 days.

The Salem Street Railway company have let their contract and no delay will be occasioned. In the course of a few days or you might say hours, the JOURNAL expects to be able to send forth the glad tidings that the Electric street railway company have closed contracts for the rolling stock, and the construction of this line through certain streets in the city. The plans and specifications are all in hand, and the contracts will have been let or rejected before the Lord's day will have occurred the second time.

That Salem and Silverton motor line will be totting away before long. The survey has been completed and the diagram is speeded. The work will be in the hands of the committee on contracts of the company in a few days when they will entertain propositions for the construction of their line.

Salem is just beginning to grow! She will make more progress in the next year than she has in the past four. There is no draw backs to contend with, no booms to excite the people but simply a steady and healthy growth.

OREGON ASSESSMENT \$100,000,000.—As the several counties in the state have not all turned their assessment roll over to the state it is impossible to exactly place the exact amount of the state taxable property. Secretary of State McBride says he estimates that the total taxable valuation of property will be over \$100,000,000, compared with \$85,000,000 for last year. "I see," he said yesterday, "that Washington territory boasts of a \$125,000,000 valuation, and looks down on Oregon. Washington has the figures, but not the valuation that Oregon has. Our pernicious assessment system is to blame for the smallness of our figures."
