ARRESTED FOR THEFT.—Yesterday morning, Marshal Ross arrested a Chinaman for stealing, and placed him in the city jail. This Celestial has been in the habit of stealing articles and selling them. The Chinaman was arrested and brought before Recorder Conn for examination. He was fined \$25 and costs, amounting in all to \$47.50, and being unable to pay the fine was sent to the county jail. The last named articles were stolen from the large new livery barn of Minto & Lowe's, and the tools belonged to Mr. Ely, one of the carpenters.

SORE.—What right has the grand jury riding around at the county's expense "investigating" the county poor house, the deaf mute school, blind school, the capitol building, the insane asylum and the "several" county offices? What right has the grand jury to hold its report over one day in order to gouge \$21 more out of the county?—Statesman. The editor and business manager of the Statesman wants to score the late grand jury by the county, and they who were to do right. For the information of that journal we will quote Sec. 52, Chap. 6, page 450, Criminal code, as per Deady's Code of Oregon. "In addition to the power and duty prescribed by Sec. 43, the grand jury has power, and it is their duty to inquire, first, into the condition and management of every public prison in the county, and 2d, into the condition and the management of the offices pertaining to the courts of justice in the county." Is that satisfactory?

THE LATE GRAND JURY.

A Fittful Kick by the Gentleman Indicted for a Flagrant Violation of Law.

The Morning Fossil has all at once become virtuous and questions the right of the grand jury to visit the public institutions of the county. In the first place it may well be asserted that the Fossil would have never thought of finding fault with the grand jury if that body had not indicted Mr. Hendricks, which shows that spite and spleen and not purity of motive dictated the growl.

It has been the custom for years and years for the grand jury to visit and examine into the management and condition of the public institutions throughout the county, and no complaint has ever been made before. Now is there any warrant for such complaint. Section 1251 of Hill's code says that in addition to the powers and duties in relation to crimes "the grand jury has power and it is their duty to inquire (1) into the condition and management of every public prison in the county, and (2) into the condition and management of the offices pertaining to the courts of justice in the county."

Section 1252 of Hill's code gives the grand jury free access to all these offices and institutions and also to the free examination of all public records in the county, thus contemplating their supervision over and examination of every public office in the county. That this carries with it a power of investigation of all eleemosynary and other institutions supported at public expense by the county or state and situated within the county, is very reasonable to suppose, and that these semi-annual visits, if properly conducted, have a healthy influence, no person can for a moment doubt.

The kick made by the Fossil is weak and puny, the product of a mind charged with vexation and ill will, the result of being caught in the violation of law and indicted for it. The present grand jury is composed of good and true citizens of the county, who performed their duty as they saw it and whose property interests in the county are sufficient.
