OREGON AS A HOME.

People in the Eastern country when contemplating going West, have, on account of the great prominence given to that country by the discovery of gold years ago, turned their attention to California as a sort of Mecca where all the pleasures of this life may be obtained.

California has eagerly seized upon the advantages to their state flowing from this opinion and have puffed and blown and fanned into an intense heat this gold begotten thought by tongue, pen and press, till they have got the world to believe it is so, says the Roseburg Plaindealer. But there is a limit and end to false notions as there is to life itself—"The truth will out." The people East have been bilked and duped by these erroneous notions; and lost money in booms in California, till, like a child burned by fire, they have got their eyes open. They have learned that the soil in that state is no richer than the soil in Oregon, and that a certainty of crops cannot be relied on. They have also learned that the people cannot subsist on climate alone. They have after long years learned that there is such a place as Oregon and that it is not as bad as represented, but on the contrary, has a good climate; better, all things considered, than California, and that Oregon can produce all the food products grown in this latitude of the earth, and what is a still more important fact, that crops are certain in Oregon. No failures have occurred since its first settlement "way back in the forties."

If also creeping into the heads of Eastern people that Oregonians are not savages and that enlightenment and that all its concomitant advantages may be enjoyed. Our educational system is excellent, as good as any in the United States, and that, as a consequence, we have an excellent state of society.

Then the price of land is on an average 100 per cent, cheaper than in California. These facts are becoming known and people are turning their attention to Oregon. This is no vain boasting no land booming scheme, no effort to induce people to purchase worthless lands. We advise all Eastern men who want to en-

joy a good climate and fine good soil to come and see for themselves, look at the country and its products and institutions, and if they find Oregon not what we claim for it, then go elsewhere. We are willing to be examined, and if found wanting will submit without a murmur to the judgment of sensible folks.

"What Will the Weather Be?"

When the temperature falls suddenly there is a storm forming south of you.

When the temperature rises suddenly there is a storm north of you.

The wind always blows from a region of fair weather towards a region where a storm is forming.

Cirrus clouds always move from a region where a storm is in progress to a region of fair weather.

Cumulus clouds always move from a region of fair weather to a region where a storm is forming.

Where cirrus clouds are moving rapidly from the north or northeast, there will be rain within twenty-four hours, no matter how cold it is.

When cirrus clouds are moving rapidly from the south or southeast, there will be a cold rain on the morrow; if it be in winter, there will be a snow storm.

The wind always blows in a circle around a storm, and when it blows from the north, the heaviest rain is east of you; if it blows from the south, the heaviest rain is west of you; if it blows from the east, the heaviest rain is south of you; if it blows from the west, the heaviest rain is north of you.

The wind never blows unless rain or snow is falling within one thousand miles north or northwest of you.

Whenever heavy white frost occurs a storm is forming within one thousand miles north or northwest of you.

Forgotten Facts About New York.

In 1825 gas pipes were first laid down in Broadway, from Canal street to the Bowery. In 1832 the cholera swept off great numbers of the inhabitants, and on the night of the 16th of December, 1835, the city was visited by a great fire, when between thirty and forty acres of land covered with the most valuable stores filled with rich merchandise, extending on the east river from Old slip and Coenties slip and back to Wall street and nearly to Broad street, was desolated by the fire. The number of buildings burned was about six hundred and forty-eight, and the property destroyed amounted to between \$17,000,000 and \$18,000,000. Among the buildings burned were the Merchants' exchange and the South Dutch church.—New York Herald.

Keeping Close to the Schedule.

England has a record for punctuality of passenger trains that is worthy of emulation by some, if not all, American railway companies. out of a total of 100,000 passenger trains on the Great Eastern road, for the first six months of this year, over 59 per cent were absolutely punctual, 37 per cent were less than five minutes late, 4 per cent were over five and less than ten minutes late, and 3 per cent were over ten minutes late in arriving at their destination.—Chicago Herald.

Native Zinc in California.

In the laboratory of the state mining bureau a discovery was made yesterday which is highly prized. In working a specimen of sulphide or blende ore sent from a mine in Shasta county a small piece of native metallic zinc was secured. Zinc is found in various forms in the United States, although never in such quantities as to make it of commercial value; but this is the first piece of the character named ever known to have been secured in this country. Late works on metallurgy note the existence in the mines of Victoria, Australia, of the only native metallic zinc known. The mining bureau will endeavor to secure other specimens from Shasta county.—San Francisco Chronicle.
