LATEST BY TELEGRAPH.

THE NEW STATES.

Anxiously Awaiting the President's Proclamation.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 28.—Prominent republicans at Olympia telegraphed here a few days ago, asking when President Harrison intends to issue his proclamation admitting the four new states. Washington is anxious to get into statehood, and the governor-elect as well as the state officers and candidates for the United States senate, are eagerly requesting an extra session of the legislature. It has been decided that the action of Gov. Millette in calling for an extra session of the legislature in South Dakota for the election of the United States senators was regular and legal. The Omnibus Statehood act provides that the legislature may meet in special session, elect senators and certify their elections to the president, with the result of the elections on the State Constitution, etc. Everything is being held back awaiting the returns from Montana. The president is not expected to issue his proclamation until the Montana returns are received, unless they are delayed indefinitely, in which event he will issue the proclamation without naming Montana.

Ruined by Whisky and Faro.

BUTTE, Mont., Oct. 28.—M. W. Wilson, a ticket-seller in the Northern Pacific office in this city took a dose of chloroform yesterday and then shot himself through the head with a revolver. He had failed to make his remittance to St. Paul for the last three days, and was short \$500. He was gambling last night and lost \$1,000, for which he gave checks. He came here three years ago from Woodstock, Canada, where his people reside, and where his body will be forwarded for interment. Whisky and faro ruined him.

New Evidence in the Cronin Case.

CHICAGO, Oct. 28.—In the Cronin trial to-day, Dinan, the livery stable keeper, testified that Coughlin, one of the prisoners, engaged the horse and buggy for a friend on the day that Cronin was murdered. This friend came in the evening and took out the white horse and buggy. The next morning Coughlin cautioned the witness not to say anything about his connection with the matter, as it was known that he and Cronin were not friends and it might get him (Coughlin) into trouble. This is the horse and buggy in which Cronin was carried to his death.

Sensational Report.

SAN DIEGO, Oct. 28.—The grand jury submitted a partial report to-night in which the supervisors are charged with having made illegal contracts for building roads and bridges and illegally ordering money to be paid to persons not entitled to it, to an amount aggregating over \$37,000. The report recommends the removal of eight supervisors, and also charges Sheriff McDowell with having appropriated to his own use over \$7,000 of county funds from the money intended for the support of prisoners.

Guilty of Murder.

KNOXVILLE, Tenn., Oct. 28.—The State Supreme Court has affirmed the verdict of the lower court in finding John Anderson, John Barnard, H. Barnard, Eliza Barnard and Clinton Barnard guilty of the murder of Henry Sutton last January. They will be hanged on December 23d. The killing was the outcome of a feud in Hancock county, which has long been noted for bloody affrays. It is believed that to-day's decision will have a good effect in the county.

Married at Last.

LONDON, Oct. 28.—The marriage of Prince Hatzfeldt to a daughter of Collis P. Huntington, took place to-day in the Catholic oratory at Brompton. The ceremony was performed by Bishop Emmons. The wedding was private, only the relatives and a few friends of the bride and groom being present. The wedding breakfast was served at the German embassy, after which they started for Italy.

Masked Robbers Make a Raid.

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., October 28.—Last night two masked men entered the Santa Fe and Atlantic and Pacific railroad station at Florville, held up the agent with revolvers, and compelled him to hand over all the railroad express funds in the office amounting to \$2,000. The sheriff with a posse and bloodhounds, is in pursuit.

FAST MAIL TRAINS.

The Time Across the Continent to be Reduced a Full Day.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 28.—General Superintendent Bell of the Railway Mail Service has made public important changes in the transcontinental fast mail service, to take effect Nov. 10, 1889. On March 4th 1889, the time going west from New York to San Francisco was 128 hours, and 15 minutes which was reduced 118 hours and 45 minutes, on May 4th, 1889, and by the November schedule the fast mail train going West from ocean to ocean will be 108 hours 45 minutes. One very important feature is that the train will reach San Francisco early in the day, and that the mails will be distributed by 10 a. m. On March 4th the time from San Francisco to New York was 141 hours. On May 4th the time was reduced to 121 hours. The new schedule will reduce the time from ocean to ocean to 111 hours, 39 minutes; that is, 4 days, 15 hours and 39 minutes, leaving San Francisco at 7 p. m., after the close of business, and arriving at New York at 10:35 a. m., with the mails so assorted as to permit of immediate delivery. This is a gain of 29:39 hours on the March schedule and a gain of 19:39 hours on May schedule, but as the arrivals at both ends will be in the morning instead of in the evening, it means a gain of a full day over the May schedule. In both directions the service for all large cars will be adjusted to unite with the transcontinental train at either Chicago, Council Bluffs or Omaha, so that the advantages will be reflected throughout the entire East and West. There will be no change of cars west of Omaha, a distance of 1870 miles. The new arrangement carries with it some very important features, as the General Superintendent of the railway mail service will hereafter have the right to fix the schedule from ocean to ocean, provided it is not made faster than the quickest limited passenger trains over the same lines. The new service is said to be of the highest importance to the transcontinental business interests of the country.

A CENTURY OLD.

The Remarkable Life and History of Mrs. Ann Baldy of Indiana.

TERRE HAUTE, Ind., Oct. 28.—Mrs. Ann Baldy was a century old the 24th inst. She celebrated the anniversary of her birth at the Old Ladies' Home. In honor of the occasion a purse of 100 silver dollars was presented to her, the contribution of numerous citizens. She was born at Saratoga, N. Y., October 24, 1789, just two years after the adoption of the Constitution of the United States. She came to Terre Haute in 1819, three years after the founding of the town. She was married to John Baldy in 1813 at Saratoga. In 1826 her husband went down the Wabash River to the Ohio, and thence down the Mississippi River to New Orleans in a flatboat. He never returned to Terre Haute. From that day to this Mrs. Baldy has heard nothing of him. She thinks he was killed by Indians, then very numerous all along the Wabash river.

For sixty-three years she has lived without a known relative. Until she was ninety she walked everywhere. She is still in fairly good health, although she is failing. She still makes her own bed, but feels bad because she can no longer read the papers. To-day she held a sort of reception at the Old Ladies' Home, many old residents calling on her and talking over old times, and she was photographed, which greatly delighted her.

Bayard's Coming Marriage.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 28.—The preparations for the marriage of Mary Wilton Clymer to ex-Secretary Thomas F. Bayard are practically complete. The bride's trousseau, which has been the subject of thoughtful consideration for several months is elegant and tasteful. The wedding will be a quiet affair, the guests being limited to the relatives and personal friends of the two families.

The ceremony will take place at St. John's Episcopal Church, which has been the scene of most of the distinguished nuptial ceremonies at the capital.
