A ROMANCE FROM YAKIMA.
There is upon the Yakima W. T. reservation, a family of half-breeds known as the Onleys. A romance is associated with the name. The white father of the Onleys died recently, but to the last he shunned his own race. In some respects he was like Sam Houston, but unlike Sam Houston he never repented of his self-banishment among the Indians. He was of a highly respectable Rhode Island family and a graduate at Yale college. About the time he completed his studies the discovery of gold in California occurred. Onley joined the Argonauts of '49 and came west to seek his fortune. He left behind a sweetheart to whom he was to be married as soon as he found the fortune and returned. The girl grew weary of waiting, as many other of her sex have done. About a year after he reached the coast Onley received a letter announcing the marriage of his betrothed. He never got over the blow. Drifting about he located in Oregon and was made sheriff of Wasco county. In those days there was usually excitement enough in the duties of sheriff to furnish the memories of the past. But during his reign he made many warm personal friends by his peculiar behavior, but after awhile Onley got tired of hunting down criminals. He gave up his office, crossed the Columbia river and became a member of the Yakima tribe. His adoption was in good faith on his part, for he took an Indian wife and raised a family. As his children grew up he educated them with care, and when he died he left them well provided for. The Onleys are an influential tribe, and they exercise that influence for good. But they have no thought of leaving the reservation. They seem to have inherited from their father this disinclination for white society.

THE MIGHTY DEEP.—The greatest known depth of the sea in the South Atlantic ocean, midway between the island of Tristan d'Acunha at the mouth of the Rio de la Plata. The bottom was there reached at the depth of 40,246 feet, or eight and three-quarter miles, exceeding by more than 17,000 feet the height of Mount Everest, the loftiest mountain in the world. In the North Atlantic ocean, south of Newfoundland, soundings have been made to the depth of 4580 fathoms, or 27,480 feet, while depths equaling 34,000 feet, or six and a half miles, are reported south of the Bermuda islands. The average depth of the Pacific ocean between Japan and California is a little over 2000 fathoms; and between Chili and the Sandwich Island, 2,500 fathoms; and between Chili and New Zealand, 1,500 fathoms. The average depth of all the oceans is from 2,000 to 2,500 fathoms.

This dance brought together a large number of the remnants of these and other tribes from Nevada and Idaho, and a general time of rejoicing and dancing has lasted for the past week. Grotesque and fanciful costumes and decorations were seen, and all the braves were painted up in great shape, "hand painted" for the occasion, regardless of expense.

WANTED TO CARRY HER AWAY.

A Sensational Scene Created at the Little Central Private School by An Escaped Lunatic.

This morning shortly after nine o'clock, or just after school had taken up for the morning, a sensation was created at what is known as the "Little Central" private school at the corner of High and Marion streets.

The school is conducted by Miss Knox, a young lady who came here from Minnesota, some three or four years ago and since that time has conducted private schools with good success. She has carried herself well since her arrival in the city and can number her friends by the score. She is not at all frivolous but on the other hand, of a very pleasant and quiet nature. While living in Minnesota she became acquainted with a young man named Charles Perry. He was only 15 years old at the time they became acquainted. He seemed at once to become infatuated with her and after she removed to this state it was not long until he was here also.

Miss Knox refused to recognize him and tried to avoid him as much as possible. Last December he was adjudged insane at Portland, and brought to the insane asylum here where he remained for several months but at last made his escape. Since that time he has been in the city several times and has followed the lady considerably. In fact she has been afraid of her life for the past two years. She would inform the authorities each time he appeared here but he was too shrewd and would never allow himself to be captured.

This morning he went to the school opened the door and attempted to seize the lady and carry her away, telling her that he had come for her and had a home prepared for herself. Miss Knox attempted to ward him off but had it not been for Frank Perryne a lad of about sixteen years he probably would have created a profound sensation as he was bent on carrying out his desire. Frank Perryne came to the rescue, and grabbing Perry succeeded in getting him to the door and called to a number of the men working on the sewer close by who came to his assistance, and they drug the crazy idiot, as he should be called, from the building. Perryne left the men in charge of the intruder and ran to the sheriff's office to notify the authorities.

Deputy Sheriff Frank Wrightman repaired at once to the scene of trouble with young Perryne, but when they arrived the men had let the would-be lover go and he was last seen making tracks for the fair grounds. Mr. Wrightman accompanied by Perryne set out after this bold bad man, and just this side of Brooks he was sighted by Perryne, and the two soon had him in the clutches of the law.

He was brought to the city and is now languishing in the county jail. Perry is about twenty-five years old, smooth faced and rather a good looking fellow.

The authorities say he is not insane but is as sound in mind as anyone. He is simply what is known as an imbecile, that is he had become infatuated with his love for the lady and is crazy on the matter.

It has not been decided what disposition will be made of this victim, who should have gone and thrown himself over some precipice and exclaimed, "Here goes nothing."

FROM HIGHLAND GROVE.—This new town plat on the Oregon Pacific railway is growing right along. It was laid off quite recently and forty lots have already been sold, several dwellings put up, some of them very neat and will be finished in good style. The ground is now being put in readiness for many more, when the weather is suitable. The building of the railroad, the manufacture and shipping of lumber, with the farming and stock growing of that locality, makes prosperity all around in every enterprise. FENCE THE TRACK.

The Alarming Increase of Accidents Demand some Provisions—The Country Thickly Settled.

The large number of accidents that have occurred on the line of the Oregon & California railroad of late demand that something must be done toward the protection of life. The most damaging wreck of the season has been caused by stock being on the track and derailing several cars, killing the poor fireman and many others narrowly escaping a horrible death.

This line of railroad as well as other lines now run through a thickly settled portion of the country. That it is settled sufficiently well enough to demand the fencing of these tracks. Its all well enough to allow a railroad to run through a barren desert without being fenced but when it comes into a civilized community and runs through stock farms and fields it should be compelled to have proper protection from stock. It is in the first place dangerous to the traveling public.

The West Shore, referring to the alarming frequency of accidents on the railroads of the northwest, caused by cattle derailing the locomotives, says that it has become a question of deep public concern. Nearly every state in the union has a statute compelling railroads to fence their right of way and build cattle guards at all crossings, and it is time such a law found its place on our statute books. At common law the railroad company has just the same responsibilities as an individual in the use of its property, and is not only not required to fence its road but is not liable for damages by reason of accidents caused by cattle straying upon the track, unless gross carelessness is shown in the management of the train. It was early recognized, however, that a locomotive rushing at great speed along on iron track was a mighty engine of destruction which could not in any way be compared to anything ordinary individuals employed in using their property, and in most states, as in Oregon, statutes were enacted rendering a company liable for all damages resulting from a neglect to fence the track. But most states have gone a step beyond this and the time has come when the step must also be taken here. Behind the existing locomotive and completely at the mercy of him who controls the iron horse are millions of human beings annually, whose lives are too precious to be placed in jeopardy simply to save a railroad company the expense of building a fence along its track. It is not enough that the companies be compelled to pay for all damages inflicted; the chief thing is to render as secure as possible the lives of those who entrust their persons to their care, and so long as the track is open to the approach of cattle, whose lives are placed in jeopardy.

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION.—Articles of incorporation were filed with the secretary of state to-day as follows: The Oregon Western Railroad company with John Kelly, Wm. F. Muir R. Koehler as incorporators. The principal office is in the city of Portland and the capital stock is divided into shares of the value of \$100 each. Their business is to build and equip railroads and telegraph lines with all the necessary branches, side-tracks and fixtures, depot and telegraph lines from the city of Portland, to Curry, Polk county, and from East Portland, to Coburn, Linn county, with branches running at a point near Silverton, Marion county and thence run in a westward direction to Woodburn.
