AN interesting discovery has been made near the deposits of kaolin recently discovered thirty-five miles north of Spokane Falls. At a depth of twenty-two feet ancient pottery of good quality was found, showing that these deposits were known to a bygone race. Fire brick made from this clay was subjected to a test of 1800 to 4000 degrees in the assay office. One brick breaking at the former and another withstanding the latter.

POSTMASTER general Wanamaker has awarded the contract for furnishing adhesive postage stamps for the year beginning on the first of January next, to the American Bank Note company, of New York. The new stamps will be about one-eighth smaller than those in present use. The one cent stamps will continue to be printed blue, the two cent stamps now printed green will be printed in bright carmine, and changes will be made in some of the other denominations.
