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WHO ARE OUR FRIENDS.—A JOURNAL reporter in visiting the State Penitentiary, through the kindness of one of the officials was given the privilege to talk a few minutes with one of the most trusted prisoners who said: "Most convicts have experienced what it is to have and lose friends—especially, to lose them. Few convicts have more than one social correspondent, and that one is almost always a relative or some one with whom they have become acquainted since their arrest and imprisonment. Many who have no business correspondence, and others neither write nor receive letters during the whole term of their imprisonment. What is becoming of all our boon companions—the men whom we favored in the days of our prosperity, those who were wont to declare eternal gratitude to us? Where are those persons who asked us to call upon them should we ever be in trouble and need a friend? Once in a while one of them nobly responds to an appeal for help, but more are dumb as the dead to an appeal for even a friendly letter. Few of us can consistently complain of such cold treatment, for it is in accord with our treatment of others. We are no better nor worse on the whole than our chosen companions; they are treating us as we would treat them were our circumstances reversed. But now comes the question of who of those we considered our friends in the past, have continued faithful in our trouble and imprisonment? Not our old associates in crime nor those upon whom we lavished our well or ill-gotten money; nor those whose favors we strove to win; but the mothers, sisters, wives, fathers, brothers, and honest friends who advised us against our evil ways and whom we ignored and neglected. It is these who have stood nearest to us in our troubles, visited us in prison and written cheering, hopeful letters."

SALEM COMES TO THE FRONT.—Salem is to have an electric motor railway, from the Chemekete out to the penitentiary and to the insane asylum. The contract for the road was signed with Messrs. Tobin & Schurz, agents of the Sprague system, in this city, yesterday by Messrs. Knight and Webb, of Salem, who came down to inspect the working of the Albany line, and finding it satisfactory, determined to have one in the Capital city. Salem is bound to keep up with the procession. The road is to be completed, and in running order in five months.—Oregonian.

THE "SPUD" CROP SHORT.—The potato crop is short and in many places the "taters" are small owing to the dry weather. Good potatoes are worth from 35 cents to 90 cents per cental, and there is considerable demand for shipment, but the surplus is small. If everybody had plenty to sell the price would be small. 'Tis ever thus. The dry season and the absence of the June rise has been favorable to low bottom lands along the Columbia, and there have been some most astonishing yields of potatoes in the rich sandy loam.

THE STATE EXCHANGE.—The State Exchange are preparing for some good and active work. At their meeting last night they discussed various plans and, etc., for the improvement of country roads. The general expression of the meeting was that something should be done in the matter. This Exchange is one of the best organized concerns in the city for public good; it is really what can be termed a branch Board of Trade.

CHRISTMAS CELEBRATION.—Company I, O. N. G., are preparing for a grand celebration and military ball at their new armory at Macleay, on Christmas evening, December 25th. The past reputation of this company is enough to insure a rousing and highly enjoyable time. They never do anything by halves. Their last celebration was a wonderful success and they promise to out do it on the Christmas celebration.

AWAY SHE GOES.—H. A. Thomas and Geo. Watt recently purchased forty-eight lots in Capital Park. They have let the contract for the grading of 19th street from State for a distance of five blocks and also intend to put down sidewalk for the same distance. The owners of this property propose to make it the choicest resident portion of the city.

MORE DARE-DEVILS.

The State Penitentiary the Scene of More Self-Hand-Amputation—The Mania Contagious.

It would seem that the state penitentiary has confined behind its walls some notorious dare devils that are determined to cheat the state out of their labor, even if their head has to be severed from their body. Did the outside world know the boldness that is possessed by some of the criminals confined behind those walls of justice little would they wonder that more such deliberate acts are not daily enacted.

Tuesday morning, while work was going on in the moulding room, two prisoners, named Burke and McCrewe, decided that they had labored enough for the state and accordingly each one grabbed a hatchet while the room was enveloped in smoke and began the self-amputation act.

Burke, who is in for three years from Portland, raised the murderous hatchet and whacked away at his left hand twice, cutting and fracturing the bones of the second and third fingers between the first and second joints. They were hacked up in such a horrible manner that the prison physician was compelled to amputate them at the second joint. Burke has only served one year of his time. He can give no reason for his rash act.

McCrewe, the other "would be hatchet and saw physician," only hacked the third finger off at the first joint. His finger was only struck once, but it was so badly injured that amputation was necessary.

There are now an even half-dozen of these "hatchet fiends" who are enjoying the surroundings in the dark cell or dungeon.

Before this hand and finger cutting was inaugurated it was the proper thing to spill some hot metal on their feet when they felt like a little rest would do them good. Supt. Downing put a stop to this by supplying all who worked in moulding room with boots and high legging.

There can be no blame attached to the prison officers, as the hatchets are necessary in moulding, and it is impossible for the guards to keep an eye on each and everyone of the 300 and over prisoners who are employed there. Those who have committed the heinous crime of cutting their hands and fingers off, can give no reason for their actions. They claim that it is not because they do not receive proper treatment, plenty of food and clothing, but say that all at once they are seized with the mania and before they realize what they are doing the murderous act has been committed.

It is more than likely before the thing is over that they will have wished a thousand times that they had never committed the act.

YOUNG MEN'S INVESTMENT COMPANY.
The Name of a New Organization which will be Worthy of Praise and of its Name—Its Object.

While the business men are striving ahead to gain fame and fortune in the city it must not be lost to sight that the young men of Salem are looking out with a sharp eye for business.

For sometime the matter of forming a company or association has been discussed, and it is now assuming definite and complete organization.

In Salem are a large number of shrewd young men who find at the end of the month that they have from five to fifteen dollars over their actual need that they would invest could they do so in a manner that would insure them any percent on their investment. Accordingly they are now organizing a company among themselves. The object of this company are various, suffice it to say that the main object is to buy, sell, loan and do a general investment business on a scale set forth by the company.

The company will be composed of young men all of whom are well and favorably known in the city. They will incorporate with a capital stock of not less than \$15,000, to be divided into equal shares. The company deserves encouragement from everyone, as it shows considerable push and enterprise by the projectors. Similar companies have been organized and run successfully in other towns, and by the right disposition shown by our enterprising citizens, the young men will succeed.

ANOTHER CRIME.—Frank Byron, the young man who is confined in the county jail on a charge of robbing Minto & Lowe's safe, confessed yesterday that he had stolen the suit of clothes and watch that was taken from J. Macy's livery stable some time last June. It seemed that one night a suit of clothes and a watch belonging to Albert Macy were stolen and a pair of shoes that belonged to Byron. Byron had taken his own shoes as a blind, and since he has been in the county jail he has confessed to taking the clothing and watch from Macy's barn. He also traded that watch off as well as the one he stole from Minto & Lowe's safe. Marshal Ross suspected Byron all the time, but could get no direct evidence to close in on him. Yesterday Byron confessed and said that the coat and vest were secreted in his trunk and that he had worn the pants out. The clothing has been recovered. The watch was traded to a man named Newton. It would seem that Byron had started out to make a business of stealing from facts that are coming to light. It is not known how soon some other case may turn up, but that to which he has confessed will send the poor devil over the road for at least one year's time.

SENT UP FOR TEN YEARS.

W. A. Hill, One of the Three Men Who Wrecked the Southern Pacific Train, Gets Ten Years.

The trial of the three young men, W. A. Hill, Fred and Herbert Rolfe, indicted for murder in the second degree for displacing the switch on the Southern Pacific railroad near Albany on July 28th, thereby wrecking the train and killing Engineer Jack Miller and Fireman Guthrie was commenced in circuit court of Linn county Thursday morning.

The trial of each occurred separately, and Hill was the first arraigned. When brought into court he was clean shaven and well dressed. He wore a chinchilla coat and had his boots neatly polished. He has grown fleshy during his confinement in jail, and hardly looks like the seedy looking fellow who appeared with his arm in a sling at the preliminary examination held soon after the terrible wreck, which caused two noble-hearted men to meet an untimely and horrible death.

The court room has been an exciting scene ever since the trial began. Hill confessed everything about the matter before the trial but his confession was ruled out during the trial. He was sent to the pen for ten years. The two Rolfe brothers were discharged yesterday as it was impossible to convict them, yet many are of the opinion that they are as guilty as Hill. Hill is twenty years old and is a victim of inflammatory rheumatism. He will probably end his days in the penitentiary, as he has a poor constitution. It looks hard that one of the three should go to the penitentiary for such a long term, while the other two are allowed to run free. Even looks hard to send Poor Hill up so long, but when it is considered that they through an act of depredation caused the death of two fellow men who leave behind two grief-stricken widows it is nothing but justice that they should suffer the penalty.

CRUEL PROCEEDINGS.—"The little boys, and some who are not so small, are in the habit of fishing for small fish along the wharves with small fish hooks baited with fish or some kind of meat and bait. When they throw the hook out the gull goes for it for all he is worth, and often swallows the bait, hook and all, and is drawn in by the heartless angler, who extracts the hook attaches a wait or tag to the poor bird and then lets it go. To-day says the Transcript some thoughtless chaps attached hooks with a line to a heavy block of wood, baited the hooks and dropped it over into the river, at the same time throwing pieces of meat and bread over to attract the gulls, which they succeeded in doing and it was but a short time until there were two of the birds fastened to the block with hooks in their beaks or necks. This is very cruel amusement, and the parties indulging in it should be punished by law, as there is a law against molesting the seagulls.
