THE details of the attempted assassination of Count Okuma, the Japanese Minister of foreign affairs, show that the methods of the nihilists have reached Japan. The assassin, instead of using the short sword that has proved so deadly in the hands of many of its predecessors, made a dynamite bomb, which he threw into the minister's carriage. The result was that the minister lost his right leg, but will recover, while the assassin cut his own throat so scientifically that he fell dead in his tracks. This bloody deed was due entirely to political passion, the would-be murderer and a friend having made a compact to kill the minister because he was giving foreigners too many concessions. As Count Okuma had just concluded a treaty with Germany which, after five years, gives the native courts jurisdiction over all Germans, the occasion was badly timed to attempt to murder him for lack of patriotism.

WHAT satisfaction it affords the iconoclast to feel he has discovered that some good thing written of was never done; that some noble character of history, legend and tradition never existed, is one of the things, which, in the language of the immortal Dunderbary, "no fellow can find out." The iconoclast says that William Tell is a myth, that Joan d'Arc is a fancy, that Shakespeare didn't write his own books, and now that Columbus didn't discover America. This latest iconoclast declares that he has been delving into the parchment records of men and things at the Bibliotheque Nationale at Paris, and has discovered St. Brandin, a renowned abbot of the fifth and sixth centuries, was the original discoverer of this continent. By and by somebody will pop up with proofs that Columbus never existed; that he is a myth, that Queen Isabella never heard of a land beyond the sea; that, in short, there was no discovering done, which is doubtful, we did it ourselves, and that Spain and all the rest of the world was colonized by our own beloved mound builders. This is what it is coming to.

## TUESDAY'S ELECTIONS.

It is very silly for the democrats to try to make people believe that the question of tariff was involved in any way in the recent elections in Ohio and Iowa. That party would be much more sensible if it would content itself with its local victories and not try to magnify state elections into matters of national importance. So far as the tariff is concerned, it cannot make a particle of difference whether Foraker or Campbell is to be next governor of Ohio; while as for Iowa, so little interest was taken in anything except the local issues that the democrats did not even make preparations to get legislative returns, though a United States senator to succeed Allison is to be elected at the coming session. The only state in which the tariff was made an issue was Massachusetts, and that the republicans carried, though the seductive cry of free wool reduced the majority in some of the manufacturing districts where the political horizon is bounded by the front doors of the factories.

A comparison of Tuesday's vote with the vote of a year ago shows that the Republicans did not begin to show their full strength. They knew that there was no national issue involved, and not being so addicted as are their opponents to voting early and often, they staid at home or went fishing or amused themselves in some other way. The consequence of the election so far as the Republicans are concerned is that they are more ready for the campaign of 1892, when the question of national supremacy is again to be tried; and when that time comes around, Iowa and Ohio will swing back into line again and roll up such Republican majorities as will make the Democrats think last Tuesday's election only the baseless fabric of a dream.

## NEW YORK LETTER.

Royalty on Sale Free Lectures—Trinity's New Purchase.

NEW YORK Nov. 8, 1889.

The gaze of the metropolitan public this week has been fastened mainly on a couple of events that were taking place across the Atlantic. It was not that any great consequences were to be attached to the marriage of two American heiresses to a couple of broken down European princesses; but the actual celebration of one and the failure of the other has served to entertain us in an admirable manner. In the Hatzfeldt, Huntington alliance it is hard to see any redeeming feature from either an American or a moral standpoint. Hatzfeldt seems to be simply a "rake" with the title of prince, and Mr. Huntington has bought this title for \$3,000,000 and his daughter, I venture to say that it's about the poorest bargain the great railway king ever made. In regard to the other case, Miss Caldwell has suddenly jumped in the eyes of the public from the sublime to the ridiculous. From giving a fortune of \$300,000 to found a great university to this amusing attempt to storm the stronghold of mock royalty and gain admittance thereto by the back stairs, is quite a step. Prince Murai, who by the way, is old enough to be Miss Caldwell's father, refused to close the bargain because he thought an allowance of \$10,000 a year was too beggarly. Miss Caldwell would not raise her bid, and so the Prince is in the market still. The young men of America can now rejoice. There is "no loss on our side."

## OUR FREE LECTURES.

The second series of free lectures for workmen and workingwomen began last week in the various grammar schools designated for that purpose. These lectures are provided by law and paid for out of public funds. More than 200 of them were delivered last winter as an experiment, and the plan was highly successful. This year it is proposed to increase the number to 480. The subjects will embrace science, politics, art, music and many other topics, all of which have been made a special study by the lecturers. As the lectures are all delivered in the evening, and in convenient places, they will undoubtedly be of great benefit to the class for which they are intended. In my opinion these lectures are a step in the right direction, and the example should be followed by every city in the country.

## WEALTHY CHURCH PEOPLE.

The trustees of St. Luke's Church, in Hudson street have decided to sell the old property and build a new church further up town. The purchaser is the Trinity Corporation and the price is \$200,000. This will add another piece of property to the immense amount of real estate which Trinity holds in this city. In fact, the corporation of Trinity Church is, with the possible exception of the Astors, the largest holder of real estate in New York. Not only has it numberless houses, stores, churches, and etc., but it also owns the sites on which are erected thousands of other buildings in all parts of the city. These are occupied for a term of years by the builders after which the entire property, buildings and all, "reverts" to the entire Corporation. Hence the enormous amount of property which has accumulated during its century or two of existence, and which is reliably estimated at \$150,000,000. The \$200,000 which it will pay for old St. Luke will hardly be missed.—Edwin Arlington.
