THE keel for the largest war ship in the world has recently been laid at Portsmouth, England. The Royal Sovereign is the name by which she will be known, and it is expected that the ship will be ready for service in 1893. She is one of four of the modern armored ships which the Admiralty has decided to construct. She will be of 14,000 tons burden and will carry four 67-ton guns of 13-inch caliber, besides a large battery of 6-inch and quick-firing guns.

THE czar of Russia is troubled in his mind because he is getting so fat. So is his imperial highness, the sultan of Turkey. Queen Victoria has been for some years as fat and heavy as the royal Georges whose portraits she is beginning to resemble so strikingly. There is an infallible remedy for all. If these three rulers will consent to live for six months as some hundreds of thousands of their subjects do year in and year out, they will not long have to complain of surplus fat.

THE exceeding low rates at which telegraphing can be done when the system is under governmental control can be seen by the experience of Hungary. A revision of the scale of charges has recently been made, and the rates will be proportioned to the distance traversed. For telegrams to Austria the new schedule charge less than one cent a word, while for local messages the charge is only half a cent, or less than the twentieth part of a cent for each word. Yet the American telegraphic monopoly insist that bankruptcy would follow if rates infinitely larger than those quoted were enforced here.

It has come to light that the death of the late Amy Levy, the young London novelist, was intentional and was caused by the fumes of charcoal. She was disgusted with the heartlessness of the world at large. Senator Hampton has been on a long horseback ride through North and South Carolina.

A NOVEL POLITICIAN.

Massachusetts has produced a fine specimen of politician. His name is Henry Cook, and he desires to represent Leominster in the Legislature. He does not ask either party to nominate him, nor does he call himself an independent, or a citizen's candidate. Having decided that he would like to occupy a seat in the legislature, he procured a large number of flaming posters announcing that on a certain evening he desired the people of the town to assemble at a public hall and listen to his reasons for aspiring to a seat in the legislature, and promising at the same time to give them a brief sketch of all the good and bad deeds of his life. At the appointed time there was an overflowing meeting and Mr. Cook appeared. Among other things, he said that his career had been somewhat "checkered," he had been a hosiery, a peddler, a tramping grocer, a stockman, a chairmaker, a comb-maker, a stableman, a blacksmith, a manufacturer, a gambler, a thief, a large real estate dealer, a lawyer and a detective, and this varied experience he thought, fitted him for representative in the legislature. He explained that he mentioned having been a tramp, a thief and a gambler, so as to head off his enemies who would doubtless make the same charge against him at some time before the election. At the present time Mr. Cook is one of the most prominent and healthy citizens of Leominster, and has for many years been honored by the community. At the close of the meeting a resolution was passed unanimously pledging those present to vote for Mr. Cook without a flourish to politics.

A Tramp Printer's Luck.

A few months ago Fred B. Manning of the New London, Conn., Morning Bulletin saw an advertisement in a Chicago paper for a lost printer whom a fortune was waiting. He recognized the name as that of a dissipated young tramp printer who had worked on the Bulletin, and communicated with the family. He received a letter in reply, inclosing \$15 with which to pay the young man's fare to New York city, where his mother lives, as soon as he should again appear in the Bulletin office.

Two weeks ago the printer turned up in Mr. Manning's office, but not in condition to understand the message that gentleman had for him. Before he could be got into condition he had left town, and though he was recaptured again and again, yet he could not be persuaded to take the \$15 and go to his mother, a home, and a fortune. A few days later, however, he promised to go to the home he had not visited for years. He kept his word and is now in New York. He has received a payment of \$6000 already due. His annual income from his father's estate is \$2,800, his mother has \$75,000 worth of property, and this wandering sot proves to be an only son and the sole heir to over \$150,000. —New York Sun.
