THE "BOYS" TO THE FRONT.

The Young Men's Investment Company File Articles of Incorporation—Will be a Success.

To-day The Young Men's Investment company filed articles of incorporation with the county clerk of Marion county and with the secretary of State. To more fully explain the objects of the company an exact copy of the articles of incorporation is printed below.

The company is composed of twenty of Salem's young men who will endeavor, to the best of their ability, to make this enterprise a success. The number of stockholders has been limited for various reasons and the stock is now eagerly sought by a number in the city.

ART. I. The name of this corporation shall be the Young Men's Investment company, of Salem, Oregon. Know all men by these presents; That the undersigned A. W. Giesy, B. E. Critchlow, J. L. Mitchell and E. A. Strong, of Salem, Oregon, have this day associated ourselves together for the purpose of forming a private corporation under the general laws of the state of Oregon, and to that end we hereby make, subscribe, and acknowledge these articles of incorporation.

ART. II. The duration of this company shall be perpetual. E. Friek, J. W. James and C. F. Palmer as incorporator.

THE INSANE ASYLUM.

The New Wing Past Nearing Completion—That Bath House—General Comments.

A representative of the JOURNAL was detailed this morning to visit the insane asylum of the state of Oregon and see how the work on the new wing was progressing. He found that the brick work had just been completed and a force of workmen will commence putting on the roof soon.

One needed improvement that Dr. Lane has added this year that he deserves credit for, is the new bath house. This improvement, when completed, will prove a beneficiary addition to the institution. The building is about 40x80 feet, and the basement of sink is thirteen feet deep. A also floor or landing has been contrived by which the depth can be made as desired from eleven feet to a few inches.

THE SANTIAM MINES.—A telegram from Gatesville says that Don Smith, of that place has sold to the Dry Gulch and Gold Mountain Mining company, of Salem, a tract of land between the railroad and Santiam river that place, embracing about seventy-five acres, for the purpose of establishing smelting works for the Santiam mines.

DRAWN FOR JURY SERVICE.—Judge Deady, of the United States court at Portland, yesterday made an order directing that the jury commissioners and the clerk of the court select 5000 names of eligible taxpayers in various counties of the state, in proportion to their population, to be placed in the box from which juries for United States court are to be drawn.

The walk in this place was built several feet from the ground and the bridging underneath has become very rotten and the walk had become almost dangerous for people to pass over.
