WHAT is considered one of the
most unaccounted for sights in
Utah is a mountain about thirty-
five miles northeast of Salt Lake
City, occupying an area of about
thirty acres, and completely and
thickly covered with oysters shells.
The mountain is 300 to 400 feet
high, and situated over 4000 feet
higher than Salt Lake City, which
is 4300 feet above the level of the sea.

THE Pioneer Press says: The election
of a democratic governor in
Iowa on Tuesday was a phenom-
enon so extraordinary, so abnormal,
so foreign to the entire historical
range of political experience in
Iowa, that the inhabitants of the
truly rural state could hardly be
more surprised if it had been twined
in the tail of some passing comet
and transferred bodily into New
Jersey.

VERMONT and New Hampshire
are both inviting foreigners to come
in and work abandoned farms on
which Americans, being unable to
make a living, refuse to pay taxes.
The native Yankee is fast becoming
a stranger to New England. He is
beginning to appreciate Missouri
farm land at its true worth, and
yearly manifests stronger inclina-
tion to come West and leave foreign-
ers to worry the stubborn glee of
the far East.

THREE years hence we shall cele-
brate the four hundredth anniver-
sary of the discovery of America.
But the process of discovery on this
continent has been going on ever
since the shores of San Salvador
first met the anxious gaze of Chris-
topher Columbus. During the last
ten years the discovery has been
made that the vast arid region of
the United States, comprising four-
tenths of the National domain ex-
clusive of Alaska, is susceptible of
reclamation by means of irrigation.

It is, however, only within the last
year that the National Government
has awoke to the importance of this
wonderful discovery. Soon Con-
gress and the country will be en-
lightened by the results of the in-
vestigations which have been car-
ried on during the last six months
by the Geological Survey, and by a
select Committee of the United
States Senate, appointed for the
purpose of ascertaining what course
the government ought to pursue in
regard to this matter. Appreciating
the importance of the subject, Frank
Leslie's Illustrated Newspaper re-
solved to present a series of four
articles in regard to it by a specialist,
as a Thanksgiving series, the first
of which will appear next week.
For this task Mr. Joseph Nimmo,
Jr., formerly chief of the bureau
of statistics at Washington, was
selected. As an officer of the gov-
ernment, Mr. Nimmo carefully
studied and reported upon the
whole subject of the commercial
and transportation interests of the

arid region, and in 1885, in com-
pliance with a resolution of the house
of representatives, he prepared a
report on the range and cattle busi-
ness of the United States, which
report threw a flood of light upon
the resources of this section of the
country. Since he retired from pub-
lic office Mr. Nimmo has spent six
months in the territories, diligently
investigating their resources and
possibilities. His professional knowl-
edge as a civil engineer has also in
an especial manner fitted him for
such an investigation and for the
task of writing in regard to the
important agricultural development
which will undoubtedly be realized
by means of a thorough and sci-
entific scheme of irrigation.

NEW YORK LETTER.

Direct Cables to England Fifth Ave-
nue Stage Row.

(Correspondence of the Capital Journal)

NEW YORK Nov. 12, 1889.

The Western Union Telegraph
company expect to have two new
cables completed within ten days
which will connect New York City,
Canada, Nova Scotia, from which
place the cables are laid across the
Atlantic. The steamer "Faraday,"
which has been used in the work,
laid the shore end of one cable last
week, and is at work on the other
now. These cables will give the
Western Union company direct
cable connection between New York
City and Great Britain, and will
make its service absolutely free from
interruption incident to winter
storms on land in this country.
Heretofore all outgoing cable dis-
patches have been sent by land to
Nova Scotia, from where they were
repeated and sent under the At-
lantic. The new method to be in-
augurated will be an improvement
on this, though it seems strange
that messages can be sent under the
sea with more safety than by land.
Twenty-five or thirty years ago the
man who would propose to lay a
telegraph wire along the bottom of
the sea in preference to stringing it
on land would be considered crazy.

THE SUNDAY QUESTION.

The question of running the Fifth
Avenue stages on Sundays, or of
not running them is creating a good
deal of commotion on the part of
the owners. The stage company is
controlled by Col. Shepard, editor
of the Mail and Express, who has
not permitted the stages to be run
on Sundays for several months. The
rest of the stockholders are opposed
to this and are making vigorous ob-
jection. They say that the com-
pany has lost thousands of dollars
since that policy was inaugurated,
and blame Col. Shepard for it. They
also charge him with trying to
"squeeze them out," and decorate
him with numerous titles besides
that of Colonel, and much less com-
plimentary. While all this is going
on the people along the line of Fifth
avenue have to walk to church
while their less fortunate brethren
of the east and west side may ride.

BALL PLAYERS FEEBLE.

The Baseball Player's National
League, which has been organized
in opposition to the old league, is
busy arranging plays at the Fifth
Avenue Hotel. A rigid contract has
been drawn up, which is to be sig-
ned by the players and the enthusias-
tic capitalists who are putting their
dollars into the new league. The
players are as anxious to have bind-
ing contracts as the capitalists and a
large number of the former are
taking stock in the new concern.
The Brotherhood intends to formu-
late rules for the next season just as
soon as they have heard the ques-
tions of finance and contracts. It is
said that grounds have been secured
in nearly every city where they are
required, and it is evident that the
boys are in for a fight against their
old employers and are determined to
win. If I mistake not, they will
have the hearty support of the base-
ball-loving public.

EDWIN ADELINGTON.

A small black-eyed woman, about
thirty-five years of age, giving the
name of Mrs. Mepsted, arrived in
the town of Warren, Minn., on
horseback on the evening of the 15th
inst., and stayed over night at the
home of Henry Wheeler. She was
up bright and early the next morn-
ing and on her way to La Crosse,
which she expected to reach that
day. She had left Denver, Colo-
rado, June 24th, on horseback, and
was on her way to N. Y., expecting
to go as far as Chicago with her
horse and the rest of the way by
rail. She made the trip two years
ago from Rochester to Denver, hav-
ing her horse shot dead under her
by a deer hunter within thirty miles
of Denver. On the last trip she used
a saddle, but this year she had a
blanket on the horse's back instead.
