She then started out state street for a walk, and near the University grounds, was overtaken by her "beautiful" husband, who proceeded to engage her in a Sullivan and Klumpp fight. He pummeled her over the head and face with his fist while his companion tin-horn gambler stood lazily up against a tree and looked on with seemingly much satisfaction.

The scene attracted the attention of a young student in the University building, who raised the window of his room and leveling a rifle at the pair, demanded the brutal slinger to "hold up his hands."
