PEKIN, China, is to have the electric light, and a Pittsburg company is to supply it.

A New process for compressing coal dust into blocks has just been invented and will be tried by the Reading railroad.

THE law-yous information is given by a Hastings Nebraska paper that a chewing gum factory is to be started in that place.

T. LOUIS has had a slight shock of earthquake, and the press of that city is using the fact as another reason why the world's fair or 1892 should be held there.

THIS season has been remarkably cold in some sections of the country, and the autumn of 1891 will be long remembered by many politicians as an extremely cold fall.

OWING to the spread of foot and mouth diseases among the cattle in Germany, the chief milk establishments in Berlin are now forced by law to boil their milk before selling it to the public.

OVER one million people, and over 375,000 square miles of domain, have been admitted into the Union this month. In no other year of the American republic has so many states, since the original thirteen, come in as have been admitted during the first eleven days of November, 1891.

LESS interest than usual was taken this year in the Lord Mayor's parade in London. But the fact is easily accounted for. The people of that city knew that Bismarck's show was soon to give his unrivaled street pageant when there would be something worth seeing.

A SWINDLER sold a Clinton county, Michigan farmer a recipe for making his wheat weigh twice as much as it ought to, who signed a contract to divide the money gained by the extra weight with the scientific swindler. The "contract" eventually turned up as a promissory note and the farmer paid \$300 for it.

OHIO has been counting up and finds that she has thirty-one different laws made for the benefit of the public which are practically inoperative. It is the same in all other states, and no city pretends to enforce one-half its ordinances. There are five law-breakers to one law-abider, and still the good work goes on and on.

THOUSANDS of dead cattle and sheep are buried in the snow drifts in New Mexico, and the depths of snow on the level is twenty inches, while many drifts are piled up seven feet high. Railroad trains have been blocked ten days. In this section so great a distance further north, it is a rare thing to have the ground covered at all.

THE governor of Mississippi is still after John L. Sullivan's scalp. He is determined to bring the scamp ringster to justice, even though he bankrupts the state. He does not propose to have any fighting on the soil of that state unless he has a hand in it. By the way he used to be somewhat of a slugger himself. He whipped Judge Phillips in a fist set to during the war in Southern Alabama; and while he was considered a "bully" in the same sense that Sullivan now is. Perhaps his persisted determination to bring Sullivan to justice for his overt act is based upon "professional" prejudice.

THE season of the year has arrived when building operations in the east are almost entirely suspended, for bricks cannot be laid in freezing weather, the frost entering the mortar and causing the walls to bulge when thawing time comes. And in nearly all the eastern and northern part of the country there will be freezing weather now for several months. While building operations there have been brought to a standstill Salem contractors are pushing their work as energetically as if it were still August. In this favored climate there will be no cessation in this direction all winter and the city's past and continuous growth will go on with no abatement, out rather with increasing rapidity during the season that the ice and frost king holds full sway in less favored sections.

OREGON CABBAGE.

Oregon will beat the world on vegetables. There is at the present time in the garden of Newberg House a cabbage plant two years old that has produced five well developed heads of cabbage and the sixth head is in the course of development at this writing. In this garden there are about 100 cabbage plants Mr. O. C. Wright, manager of the house informs us, has supplied the hotel with cabbage for the last year with the exception of one week, when he had to buy, and cabbage is now going to waste. When a head is cut off the stub will immediately send out a shoot, upon which another head will develop. In this same garden at the present time there are new potatoes as large as walnuts upon vines that came up about Sept. 1st. There are also peaches in full bloom. Tomato vines with green tomatoes, radish plants in full bloom, with the busy bees humming among them, gathering sweet honey to supply the needs of the people of the blizzard-stricken regions of the East. Who can bent this outside of Oregon?—Newberg Graphic.

Laborers' Houses in Berlin.

Some startling and painful facts were brought to light at a conference of the Societies for the Promotion of Morality held last month in Berlin. In a paper on the housing of the poor in Berlin it was stated that half (1) of the dwellings consisted of one room, to which in some rare cases a small cupboard-like one is attached. In one of these rooms are often found sleeping from ten to fifteen persons, old and young; one hundred thousand men and more sleep in cellars and attics. In one house as many as 2000 persons are to be found herded together. The number of illegitimate births in Berlin is 10 per cent. or double the number in London. The prices paid for rooms are very high, and one consequence of this is that very many of the 50,000 prostitutes in Berlin are received into families as lodgers, with a view to the lessening of the rental. There are the ladies of the house, and both parents and children shun them; and the latter, seeing the idle life these lodgers live and the beautiful clothes they wear, soon learn to enter on the same awful course.—Pall Mall Gazette.

Salt as an Article of Diet.

The importance of salt as an article of diet, according to a scientific writer, is overrated. A continued use of large quantities of salt will produce scurvy. The popular belief that an appetite for salt is universal among the lower animals is without any foundation in fact. Dogs, cats and other carnivorous animals show no fondness for it, and the same is true of the fruit-eating animals. Even herbivorous animals do not eat salt regularly with their food, but only at long intervals, which suggests the thought that perhaps they take it as a vermifuge. In certain parts of the world where salt is unknown antelopes abound in countless numbers, and in parts of Africa where salt is abundant the antelopes show no fondness for it. There are many instances in which flocks of sheep and herds of cattle have been reared successfully without salt. In certain parts of Central Africa salt is more scarce than gold, and to say that a certain man eats salt is to say that he is very rich. Yet the people living there have existed for ages and have enjoyed the best of barbarous health without using salt from infancy to old age. Salt is not in use in Siberia as a common constituent of food, and the same was true of the North American Indians previous to the discovery of the continent by the Europeans, and for many years after, and is still true of the Pampas Indians of South America.

Great Britain, Sir Lowthian Bell

says, saves 4,000,000 tons of coal a year by utilizing the gases which once escaped from furnaces. As the pig iron made in this country for 1890 will be within 10 per cent. as much as that made in Great Britain the saving here must be 3,600,000 tons, or 10 per cent. of the anthracite output. Yet this is a mere trifle to the saving which will be made when the slag is used as a fertilizer, the waste products of coking saved and all the combustion of coal carried on so as to utilize the waste products of our wasteful way of using coal to make heat and steam.

The deepest bore hole in the world

claimed at different times for a number of places, is, according to the latest accounts, at Schladebach, a small German village near Leipzig. It measures 17,484 meters, or about 5755 feet. The time expended in boring to this depth amounted to six years, at a cost of \$52,500. A peculiar experience encountered in connection with this and other deep holes in different parts of Germany,

according to Uhland's Wachen-schrift, is that the observed temperatures, while steadily increasing with the depths, show a smaller ratio of increase in the lower strata.

A Birmingham man has invented a metal that can hardly be distinguished from gold. It is like the precious metal in all its best points, can be hammered and drawn equally well, and presents a good wearing surface. It is not a compound, and gains its gold color from the action of a chemical. The inventor has placed samples of his discovery on the market and expects to begin its manufacture soon. It can be made for sixty cents a pound and may be used extensively in the manufacture of cheap jewelry.
