A FEARFUL WRECK.

The Tug Fearless Lost With All on Board at the Mouth of the Umpqua River.

The sad news of the loss of the tug Fearless reaches the city today and is as follows:

The tug Fearless, of Coos bay, Captain James Hill commanding, ran on to North Spit, at the mouth of the Umpqua river, Tuesday evening, and soon went to pieces, not one of the crew or passengers escaping. She was on her return trip from Astoria, where she had to go to take a lot of Chinamen, lately discharged from the canneries on Coos bay. At 3 p. m., Tuesday, she was seen off Upper Ten Mile, steaming slowly down the coast outside the breakers, which were running very high, and at 6 o'clock her whistle was heard off the mouth of the Umpqua. At a quarter to seven she gave three sharp whistles, which was the last seen or heard of her until the next morning, when her pilot house with the end stove in, a small boat, the stern, one side of her hull and numerous small pieces were discovered coming up the river with the tide. The steamer Juno at once steamed down to the mouth of the river and put a searching party ashore and the beach was patrolled for miles to the south, but no bodies were discovered. Other parties who came down the coast from the north reported that they had seen no bodies in that direction. The general impression of seafaring men is that she had sprung a leak, and that the captain was attempting to get into the river in order to save the lives of those on board, and either miscalculated his position or was blown out of his course by the heavy wind prevailing at the time. The number lost is said to be from ten to fifteen souls.

The Fearless was not generally considered seaworthy. She was built on Coos bay about seventeen years ago and was owned by Simpson & Co.

The following named were among the lost: James Hill, captain; Walter Keating, and Henry Crow, engineers two deck hands, George Marshall, a canneryman.

Captain James Hill, was a gentleman who was well known over the state. He has been a captain on those waters for the past 12 or 15 years and in this time has been in three or four bad wrecks but has luckily escaped unharmed until the last one in which it is supposed beyond a doubt that he has lost his life. Captain Hill was a son-in-law of Hon. P. P. Palmer, of Scottsburg, Douglas county, and his wife is a niece of Mrs. W. H. Byars of this city. The poor unfortunate victim leaves a wife and three children to mourn the loss of their father.

Captain Hill was well acquainted with the mouth of the river, and it is supposed that the gale was so strong that it drove the vessel from its bearings and tore it to pieces. The scene where the wreck occurred is a devastating one.

Duration of a Lightning Flash.

The researches of Dufour, Colladon and Trouvelot have shown that the duration of a lightning flash is not infinitesimal, but that the flash lasts a measurable time. For instance, explains science, if one sets a camera in rapid vibration, and exposes in it a plate so as to receive the impression of the flash, it is found that the impressions appear widened out on the negative, showing the negative to have moved during the time the flash was in existence.
