TO LICENSE ARCHITECTS.

Simply a Protective Measure—Better Buildings, Greater Safety—It is in Force in Other States

It is probable that the next legislature of Oregon will be asked to pass a law which shall require all architects in Oregon to pass an examination and receive a license or certificate which will allow them to do business in the state, as is the case with doctors and lawyers.

A JOURNAL reporter in talking to a prominent architect to-day asked the gentleman's opinion on the subject, when he said: "I think that such a law should be passed, and it undoubtedly will be before long. Texas already has such a law, and the architects of New York, Massachusetts, Illinois and Ohio are now agitating the question, and will make an effort to have the legislatures of their respective states pass such a law."

In Texas there are three classes of architects according to the law. That is, three grades of certificates are issued, according to the kind of examination passed by the applicant. The object of such a law is to protect the public from poor buildings, and prevent incompetent men from working at the profession. The same reasons hold good in this place that apply to the examinations which doctors, lawyers and other professional men have to pass. "What we want," continued the gentleman, "is to require all architects to be able to calculate the strength of walls, floors and posts, and be able to construct trusses."

Salem must look to her interests in the coming City election

They should be able to do all work necessary to insure the erection of first-class buildings that will not endanger the public. We would then have better brick, better plumbing and better plastering.

"It will be recommended that a board of five architects, who have had six or eight years' experience, be appointed by the governor and confirmed by the legislature, to constitute the examining board. The members of the board should be appointed for five years each, and their terms of office arranged so that the term of one of them shall expire every year. The law will not prevent a builder from drawing his own plans or aim in any way to hinder a man from building as he pleases, except that where architects are employed they shall be made responsible for the work they do. If an accident occurs in a building the plans for which have been drawn by an architect, that architect alone is to be held responsible. The law, if passed, will require the prosecution of the architect in such a case according to law and a fine from \$100 to \$500 should be imposed. The effect of the law will be to protect the public from poor buildings and require architects to be extremely careful, as they should be, that contractors, who work under their supervision shall perform their work in a faithful and competent manner."
