PRINTER-LAWYER.—In giving an account of the securing of a jury in the case of the Commonwealth vs. Neff, charged with the murder of McCausland, the Washington, Pa., Journal of November 16th, has the following in regard to James E. Sayers, who will be remembered by many here and in Salem, says the Oregonian, as he was some sixteen years since connected with the Oregonian, and afterward with the state printing office when Semple and Patterson were state printers: "Of the defendant's counsel, James E. Sayers, Esq., of Waynesburg, was called in the beginning of the series of trials growing out of the McCausland murder. He is now 44 years of age and has practiced law for fifteen years. He is a graduate of the Indiana State university law department, and has been prominent in politics for a number of years. He was a delegate to the national republican convention in 1884, and the republican nominee for congress from the Twenty-first district in 1889. He also served three years in the army, enlisting at the age of 18. Mr. Sayers fought the Clark, Taylor and Neff cases through from the start. He is known as one of the best lawyers at the Greene county bar."
