Santiam Mines.

Mr. E. J. McCaustland, surveyor, with party of seven assistants, returned from the mines of the Dry Gulch, Gold Mountain Consolidated Gold and Silver Mining company, yesterday. They have not yet quite completed their work, having about one week's work of surveying to complete the flume. Mr. McCaustland will make his report during the coming week when we shall lay before our readers the result of his work, not only of the survey, but of the cost and distance required to obtain water, besides the value of the company's mine, both placer and quartz, which, from our interview, the mines are more valuable than the public is aware of.

GIVE THEM A CHANCE.

A Few Solid Facts to Ponder Over in
Regard to Our City—Lend Your
Ear and act in Accordance

By reference to a map of the Willamette valley it will be seen that eight lines of railroad are in operation in the valley, viz: the east and west side O. & C., east and west side N. G. & O. R. & N. Co., N. P. R. R., P. W. V., & O. P., and two other lines will be in operation in less than a year, viz: Albany and Astoria and Hillsboro and Astoria and still another company has organized and ready for business, the Oregon Western; making in all eleven lines of railroad within fifty miles and more than one-half of them within fifteen miles of Salem. Out of this immense investment of capital and these well recognized facilities for building up cities and developing the country, Salem has one railroad and it is a prominent fact in the history of the city that some hostility was shown toward that line when it was built, resulting in the present arrangement of the passenger depot in the vicinity of Turner and a plug switch for freight traffic.

During the past twenty years the railway system of the Willamette valley has been gradually taking shape and inside of the next five years will be fixed for all time. Eight towns much smaller than Salem have now two or more railroads each and there never was a time in the history of the valley when the citizens of the different trade centers were so thoroughly aroused to the importance of securing good transportation facilities at the present time. In every other respect except transportation facilities Salem is very far ahead of any city in Oregon except Portland, but the indifference of the citizens of the Capital city upon the vital point is unaccountable. Salem has never given one dollar towards getting a railway, and now that a company is organized and claims to have the capital and right of way necessary to build a motor line between Salem and Silverton, thus giving a second direct line to Portland, there has been no action whatever taken by the city or any of its citizens to display any interest in this undertaking or any desire that it might succeed, while on the contrary there have not been lacking those who are ready to suggest objections and to place difficulties in the way of its construction; this is the more remarkable when it is considered that this company have never asked for any subsidy or bonus except the right of way into the city, and the building of this line would double the value of real estate in Salem; it would give such an impetus to business as has not been felt here for twenty years, it would be a strong inducement in the way of getting a transcontinental line, and the improvement in real estate values and business resulting from its construction would so encourage the property owners of Salem and increase their confidence in the future of the city that no difficulty would be experienced in raising \$100,000 to be used as a subsidy to induce the building of the transcontinental line through Salem and to the sea, all of this without the investment of a single dollar; and yet from present appearances the entire project may fall without the expression of a single word of regret.

In all other respects except that of securing railway facilities, Salem is second to no city in the valley, in enterprise and liberality. A remarkably liberal subsidy was raised for the woolen mill. The Salem Street Railway company has received in subsidy and donations an amount almost equal to the capital stock of the company. Numerous real estate companies have been formed with large capital, cheerfully and confidently subscribed for the platting of new additions to the city, making extensive improvements and doing a general real estate business equal to any city of its size in the state. The success and prosperity of these companies in common with that of every business man and property owner in the city requires increased immigration and the promotion of the growth of the city; it is a well established fact based upon the experience of the past fifty years that no city can grow and flourish and become a trade center, much less can it compete with river cities except in proportion to transportation facilities and the time has come when Salem must have either more and better facilities or else give up all aspirations in the way of its growth and prosperity.

LIVELY RUNAWAY.—A lively runaway occurred this morning. A team belonging to the Salem Truck & Dray company became frightened near the freight depot and ran away. They ran up Commercial street to State, then to the barn on Front street. No damage was done.

DEATH TRAPS.

The Tug Fearless a Death Trap—The
Inspectors Should be Compelled
to Enforce the Rules.

A gentleman called at the Journal office last evening, from the scene of the fatal spot where the steamer tug, Fearless met with such a fate a few days since, in which all on board have met a watery grave. The gentleman, who is a reliable and trustworthy man, stated that several years ago Captain A. M. Simpson, owner of the Fearless, stated that the Umpqua bar was the best on the coast between the Columbia River and the Golden Gate and said further that he would give a handsome sum of money was the Coos Bay harbor as good.

The Fearless was taken off the Columbia river some several years ago, being "Unsea weather" and why such a death trap should be allowed to ply on the waters for several years afterwards is a question for the careless inspectors to answer. At present we are informed that there are a number of just such death traps as the ill-fated Fearless, plying the waters of Coos Bay and Coquille river. If such is the case the government inspectors should be held accountable for every life lost.

Captain Hill was one of the most careful and cool men that has ever been engaged in this service. He was well known all along the coast. During his number of years' service on the waters he has had some marvelous escapes from death. Fifteen years ago he was captain of a tug bearing the same name as the one on which he lost his life last week. A heavy gale came up and the boat was driven on the "North-spit" at Coos Bay. The vessel was dashed to pieces and Captain Hill swam ashore and succeeded in saving all on board. For this daring feat he was highly honored and his name went forth all over the coast as a man of bravery. Again about five years ago while he was captain on the famous old craft known as the "Sol Thomas" which plied on the waters from Marshfield to Empire, it blew up midway between the above points and all on board were instantly killed, but Captain Hill. He was at the wheel at the time, and was thrown high in the air and fell on the deck somewhat stunned. His escape was a marvelous one. The third and last week though has cost him and his fellow companions their lives.

Up to yesterday, no bodies had been floated ashore. A patrol is kept on hand day and night, watching for any bodies that may be washed ashore.

It is the supposition that the boat sprang a leak and went to pieces of her own accord as an examination of the wood of the hull shows that it was old and crumbling and not safe under any circumstances whatever. There should be a thorough investigation of this matter and the inspectors made to give a report.

The JOURNAL is just in receipt of a small piece of the wood that composed the hull of the above ill-fated vessel. An examination shows that the wood is badly decayed and should have been condemned years ago. The wood can be seen by calling at this office.

Do the Taxpayers Want Him?

It is understood that Mr. Wm. Claggett who received the nomination for councilman last night in the First ward is already talking around the streets that "he will see if they open Division street."
