DAMAGING RAINS.
WASHOUTS ON THE ROADS NEAR SHASTA.
A House at Redding Struck by Lightning—Streams About Chico Rising—Storms in the South.
SHASTA, Dec. 6.—An unusually heavy rainstorm, accompanied by thunder, lightning and hail, visited this place last evening, causing considerable damage to the roads south of here. The southbound stage was delayed here twelve hours by high water. The road from Shasta to the railroad at Middle Creek, a distance of three miles, is washed out for fifty or sixty feet in many places, damaging the road to the extent of \$1000. It will probably be three weeks before the road can be repaired for travel. All travel to that place in the meantime will go via Redding. The amount of the rainfall for the twenty-four hours ending at noon is 3.75 inches.

REDDING, December 6.—There was a severe storm last night, and lightning flashes were frequent. W. P. England's residence was struck by lightning, and a large hole was made in the northeast corner of the house. The current followed down a post, ran along the sill, and passed into the ground. The damage was slight.
A cloudburst above Redding washed out about seventy feet of the railroad track, delayed the overland train for several hours.
CHICO, December 5.—Chico experienced the hardest rain storm this afternoon known for years. The rain fell in perfect torrents, accompanied by sleet, hail, thunder and lightning. Creeks and mountain streams are rising very rapidly. Some damage has been done by leakage.

LOS ANGELES, December 5.—The rainfall for the twenty-four hours ending at 5 p. m. to-day was .11 of an inch, making the total for the season 10.32 inches. The storm appears to be over here.
SAN BERNARDINO, December 5.—Twelve one-hundredths of an inch of rain fell last night, and it looks as if more would follow to-night.

FARMERS AND LABORERS.
What Their Convention is Doing at St. Louis.
ST. LOUIS, Dec. 6.—The Farmers' and Laborers' Union resumed their sessions this morning, but in the absence of reports from the committees most of the time was taken up in speech making.
The joint committee of the Union and Northern alliance appointed yesterday, after a long conference last night, failed to agree upon a plan of consolidation. This morning a new committee was appointed.
Ralph Beaumont, chairman of the National Legislative Committee of the Knights of Labor, and one of the committee to confer with a committee from the Farmers' Alliance and Laborers' Union, said this afternoon: "We have no intention of endeavoring to effect a consolidation with the Farmers' Alliance and Laborers' Union. As I understand it, the Northern and Southern Farmers' Alliance, the Farmers' Mutual Benefit Association and the Agricultural Wheel have consolidated, and we are to confer with them with a view to furthering the interests of both organizations in the way of co-operation, not consolidation. We are both working for the same ends, and this conference is for the purpose of establishing confidence in each other. We shall agree that when the farmers put a candidate in the field for either a legislative, senatorial or presidential position we will support that candidate, and they will do the same for us. It may be possible that at some future period we shall consolidate, but at present we will not try anything of the kind."

FEARED SHE IS LOST.
The British ship *Hermione* Thought to be Lost.
PORT TOWNSEND, Dec. 6.—The tug *Pilot* returned to port this morning, having been unsuccessful in her search for the British ship *Hermione*, reported lost. The *Hermione* was an iron ship, rated 100, A1, built at Aberdeen, in 1876, sailed from Portland, grain laden for the United Kingdom November 28th, and in going out, left the channel and struck heavily on Peacock spit, the tug having her in charge not being heavy enough to control her. She was afterwards spoken by a schooner bound for Port Townsend, which reported her leaking badly

'GUILTY OF FORGERY.'
The Conclusion of a Queer Case in Albuquerque.

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M., Dec. 6.—A verdict of guilty was rendered in the District Court in a case of a very singular and sensational character. In December of last year a woman living in a quarter of Albuquerque known as "Hell's Half Acre," by name Juanita Martinez de Cuitinola, who was supposed at the time to be very ill, sent for a Justice of the Peace and turned over to him for collection what purported to be an original deposit receipt for \$1800 in her favor, signed by Rev. A. M. Gentile, superior of the Jesuit House of Priests in old Albuquerque.
Upon the paper being presented, the clergyman denounced it as a forgery, and a warrant was sworn out for the woman's arrest. She was bound over and afterwards indicted, and after a five days' trial for uttering a forged instrument, she was found guilty and the penalty assessed at one year in the Territorial Penitentiary.

The woman swore she paid the money to the priest, and was corroborated by a witness swearing that he went with her and saw her carry the money into the house. Another witness said he saw the woman there with the money. The character of these witnesses was successfully impeached. The case is regarded as strange, and perhaps unprecedented.

THE MINNEAPOLIS DISASTER.
Funeral of Some of the Victims—The Inquest.

MINNEAPOLIS, December 6.—The funeral of the two operators, James F. Igoe and Walter E. Miles, of the Associated Press, took place this afternoon. Four fellow-operators from the Associated Press, four from the Western Union and four from the North American Telegraph Company acted as pallbearers. Commercial Editor Millman's funeral was also held this afternoon, and his body was to-night sent to Broadhead, Wis. All day to-day the Coroner's inquest continued, the jury hearing evidence as to the deaths of the different persons in the building, the efforts to secure better fire protection and other matters pertaining thereto.

Attempted Murder and Suicide.
SPOKANE FALLS, Dec. 6.—This morning at 10 o'clock, R. L. Sanderline, a pastry cook, shot his wife and attempted to kill her. Thinking he had done so he blew his own brains out. Both were colored. They had not lived happy for some time, occupying the house, but different rooms. A few days ago she left him and began proceedings for a divorce. This enraged Sanderline and was the cause of the tragedy to-day.
His first shot missed her, when he caught and threw her on the floor and placing a pistol behind her ear, fired. The man lingered unconscious until 2:40 this afternoon, when he died. The woman will live. Sanderline's father in Denver, keeps a large barber shop, and is worth \$75,000.
