## IMPORTANT MURDER TRIALS

SENSATIONAL CRIMES IN BOTH CASES THAT ARE BEING TRIED.

Accused in One Case, and the Other Drawing Wide-Spread Attention—Jealousy in Both Instances.

SPOKANE FALLS, December 14.—The jury in the case of Michael Liebold, charged with the murder of Thomas Fallon in this city on the night of May 24, 1887, brought in a verdict of not guilty at 7 o'clock this morning, after being out fifteen hours. The trial lasted five days. Fallon kept a saloon here in 1887. Liebold was his barkeeper. On the night of the killing Liebold and Mrs. Fallon were out walking together. Soon after they returned to the saloon Fallon was shot through the head. Liebold summoned a doctor, saying Fallon had committed suicide. A week after Fallon's death Liebold married Fallon's wife and the couple went to California with \$9000 of Fallon's money. The principal witness for the prosecution was William Eagan, who testified that Liebold confessed to him at Moscow, Idaho, last May that he had murdered Fallon.

## A SPOKANE MURDER CASE.

One Skeels on Trial for Killing Her Husband.

SPOKANE FALLS, Wash., Dec. 13.—The trial of Miss Ione Skeels, better known as "Bronco Liz," for murdering her husband, Charles W. Skeels, in this city on the 1st of March last, began in the Superior Court to-day. The murder was prompted by jealousy. Mrs. Skeels decoyed her husband from the room of Frankie Howard, a variety actress, by sending a boy with a message to the effect that he was wanted at his place of business. When he appeared in the hallway she fired three shots in rapid succession, one of which took effect, proving fatal. Skeels first met his wife in a dance house at the Cour d' Alene mines several years ago, and tired of her after marriage, and gave too much attention to other women, and his wife often told him she would kill him if he did not stop it. Both parties were well known in Montana, Northern Idaho and Eastern Washington. The shooting created a great sensation at the time, and the trial is attracting wide attention.

## SUFFERED THE PENALTY.

A MURDERER HANGED FOR A HORRIBLE CRIME.

John Gilman hanged at Empire City, for One of the Most Cold-Blooded Crimes on Record.  
EMPIRE CITY, Or., Dec. 14.—John Gilman, murderer of Mrs. Etonhoyer and child, was hanged yesterday in the jail yard. He mounted the scaffold at 1 o'clock with a firm step, murmured a few indistinct words and bade the crowd farewell. Death was instantaneous. Gilman leased land to Etonhoyer. The two quarreled and Gilman wanted his tenant to vacate, but the latter refused to go until the expiration of his lease. One day when Etonhoyer was away at work Gilman killed Mrs. Etonhoyer and her little child and buried them and dug a grave for the husband. When the latter came home and called for his wife to come and row him across a river which separated the two families' residences, she did not respond, but Gilman appeared and offered to take him over in his (Gilman's) boat. He had a club in the boat with which he had planned to kill the man, but failed to attack him until he got across. Then a struggle occurred, the noise of which attracted the neighbors. Etonhoyer was badly used up but recovered. Search for the missing wife and child resulted in the discovery of their remains and the open grave that awaited their husband and father. Then Gilman confessed. The object of the crime was to regain possession of the leased land without waiting for the term to expire. Full particulars of the crime was given in the Journal some time ago.
