MARKET REPORT.

A Synopsis of the Markets—Buying and Selling Prices.

The continued bad weather has had the effect of advancing prices in many cereals. Potatoes have advanced from 50 cents to 65 cents for the consumer, and it would seem as if the hens were all on a strike, as that fruit has advanced to 35 cents per dozen, and somewhat scarce at that figure. While wheat remains the same, shorts and chop feed have taken a slight advance. It may not be unexpected to see a rise in wheat in a few days. Meats remain stationary and firm. Poultry has commanded a good price during the holidays, but will probably drop a notch or two soon.
