ter just as soon as we put the matter

A NOVEL scene took place last
Saturday before the Ways and
Means committee at Washington.
General Imboden, a democrat from
Virginia, appeared before that body
in behalf of the iron and coal inter-
ests of the South. Here are his
burning words: "We have seen the
North grow prosperous under the
policy of protection, and we de-
sire a share of that prosperity. I ap-
peal to you, gentlemen of the com-
mittee, on behalf of the South, not
to remove the duty upon iron ore.
The small income derived from this
source will make a very little differ-
ence with your surplus, while the
removal of the duty will ruin us."
There is not the least doubt but
the South in its entirety favors the pro-
tection principle, and needs but to
get out from under the iron hand
of the democratic party to assert
that principle.

THE Magazine of American history
opens the New Year and its
twenty-third volume with a bright
and readable January number. This
periodical seems to be on the flood-
tide of the newly awakened popular
interest in everything that relates to
the heroic past. An admirable por-
trait of William Cullen Bryant
forms the frontispiece, and an ani-
mated and welcome paper by the
clever editor treats of his place in
American history. "A Rare Picture
of Early New York" painted on the
panel of an old Dutch war vessel, a
view never before published, is a
contribution both in text and illus-
tration from the famous collector Dr.
Thomas Addis Emmet. It is not
only the best publication of its kind
on the continent, but there really is
no other which approaches it in
scope and general breadth and ex-
cellence of character, while in typog-
raphical beauty it is ahead of all
its contemporaries, whether histori-
cal or otherwise. Price \$5 a year.

GERMANY is becoming enthused
with the desire to have a boom, and
arrangements are now on foot for
a mammoth advertising scheme.
The plan is to carry over the world
a vast collection of German manu-
factures in a steamship constructed
especially for the purpose. The
steamship will be somewhat larger
than the City of New York, will be
heated by steam, lighted by elec-
tricity, will move at the rate of
fifteen knots an hour and will be
called the Kaiser Wilhelm. It will
have three decks, like the best
North German Lloyd ships. The
eight big exposition rooms on the
second deck will be divided into
compartments to be let at reasonable
rates to exhibitors. A compartment
12x13 feet will be rented for \$500 per
year. Exhibitors may accompany
their exhibits on the tour of the
world, or send agents, at a reason-
able extra expense, or may com-
mission the managers of the exposition
to close all their business bar-
gains with foreign buyers. This
project is the outgrowth of western
booming methods, which have to a
considerable extent infected the en-
tire civilized world. Its worse than
the influence.

nia, has received permission from
Emperor William to have a copy
made of the "Mistine Madonna" in
the Dresden gallery, the only con-
dition being that the emperor shall
name the artist.

THE WAYS OF THE WEALTHY.

William H. Smith, millionaire in-
terested in coal and salt mining, has
a bill of \$2,600 against the Retsof
Salt Mining Company of Newark,
Livingston county, for two days
work as a common laborer in the
Retsof mines. The bill will proba-
bly be disputed, but Smith doesn't
care, for, acting upon knowledge
gained during the two days he
took his place with the laborers in
the mines, he has purchased a val-
uable bit of salt territory which
promises to net him a handsome
profit.

Smith presented himself at the
office of the Retsof Company the
other day and asked for work. He
was engaged as a common laborer
at 1.30 per day and sent down into
the mine. On the third day he
pleaded sickness and was granted a
day off. He was well enough how-
ever to drive to the farm house of
L. H. Gray, who owned a valuable
tract of salt territory the Retsof peo-
ple had been negotiating for. Smith
said he was an employee of the Ret-
sof Company and asked Gray what
he would take for his land.

"Two hundred dollars per acre for
400 acres," was the reply and the
words had hardly been uttered
when the indisposed miner pulled
\$10,000 in bills from his overalls to
bind the bargain. The agreement
was drawn up whereby Gray was
to transfer the entire estate for \$80,
000, and Smith returned to the shaft
and announced that he had recov-
ered from his indisposition and re-
solved to work underground.

Gray happened to meet an officer
of the Retsof company on that same
day and remarked that he had
finally concluded his bargain with
one of their men. Explanations
which followed were not calculated
to put the Retsof people in good
humor.

They called the men up from the
mine in order to identify the party
of the second part of the sale he had
consummated. When Smith was
pointed out he was promptly dis-
charged.

The Retsof people were chagrined
over the way they had been out-
witted and were willing to raise
Smith's ante, but it was too late.
Smith is extensively interested in
coal and oil lands in Pennsylvania.
The land he purchased from Gray
is believed to be the richest salt ter-
ritory in Western New York.

SINCE the grand stroke for free
government in Brazil, there is grow-
ing up a desire for like privileges on
every hand. The latest instance is
that of Wales. Leading members
of the Welsh National council are
considering a scheme of home rule
for their country to which they
hope to induce parliament to pay
some attention. The chief points of
the Welsh plan are: A local parlia-
ment in Wales, which shall be
elected on the basis of household
franchise, one member being al-
lowed to each district of 40,000 popu-
lation; a three-year's session of
parliament; a governor to be ap-
pointed by the crown, to serve five
years, with power to veto any mea-
sure passed by the majority of the
local parliament, such measure,
however, if repassed by two-thirds
majority to be thereupon referred to
the Imperial parliament; power of
taxation for raising loans for local
purposes; control of prisons, ad-
ministration of justice and direc-
tion of the police; autonomy in all
matters of religion, agriculture, la-
bor and education, and manage-
ment or sale of Crown lands.

THE closing down of the Penn-
sylvania coal mines for lack of rail-
road accommodations will throw
not less than 10,000 operatives out of
employment. It seems the mines have
business enough, but can't get the
cars to transport their orders. We
can now expect democratic papers
to explain this state of affairs by
saying that President Harrison is
in the White House.

Queer Facts About Figs.

While musing upon the many
wonderful products of nature, how
many stop to consider the pecu-
liarities of the fig? It is utterly un-
like any other fruit, in that it has
no blossom. Every other fruit
heralds its coming and gives its
promise with a flower. And then
most certainly the fig must have
lungs or breathing places, for from
the little button at the end there are
minute ducts or air spaces, which
run right through the fruit and
clear into the stem. If, in drying,
the fig is not placed as it grew on
the tree, the fruit sours and moulds.

It would seem that these air ves-
sels must be placed so as to exhale
while the fig is drying, even as they
exhale while it is growing. The
fruit does not hang from the tree,
but inclines upward, held up by the
stem, and this button or mouth
opens toward the sun. If not so
placed when being dried, the but-
ton is shaded and the fruit then
spoils. Altogether the fig is one of
the most remarkable of all nature's
products.—Kern County Californian.
