THE FALL OF SNOW.—Reports from all parts of the Inland Empire show that more snow has fallen throughout that section than for several years past. In the south-east portion of the state the snow is very deep, and the snow is deep in the Cour d'Alene mountains, and there is snow all the way from there to Portland. The snow inures good crops in the Eastern portion of the state and plenty of water for mining operations, and is not so severe on stock as it used to be in years gone by, as most stockmen now provide a supply of fodder for their cattle, and those who did not do this got rid of their cattle last fall. During the past forty-eight hours a heavy fall of snow has occurred throughout the valley, and will have a telling effect upon crops next year, and also succeed in making the river navigable to a greater extent.

GRAND LARCENY.—This morning a tramp, who gave his name as Sam Newton, broke into the Chinese section house at Jefferson, and was about to carry off the whole house, when his lordship, Mr. Celestial appeared upon the scene who ran to the section boss and gave the alarm. The section boss went to the house and at the point of a pistol made the intruder walk into town, where he was placed in charge of city Marshal Sam Critchlow. The gent was given a preliminary examination, and held for the action of the grand jury charged with grand larceny. He will board at hotel de l'oisin during the time between now and the time the grand jury meets.

WHEN THE SCHOOLS WILL OPEN.—The city schools will open for the winter term on Monday, January 6th. The principals of the various ward schools will be in their respective rooms on Saturday afternoon, January 4th, to examine and assign pupils. In the East Salem school only a limited number of new pupils can be accommodated, owing to the crowded condition of all the rooms. The children have enjoyed themselves during the holidays, and will be ready to enter upon their school duties next Monday morning with a much lighter heart. Salem can well be proud of her free schools.

A TRUSTY NOT TRUSTY.

A Convict at the State Penitentiary Goes For a Lark and Has a Way-up Time, but is Captured.

There was considerable trouble experienced last evening at the Oregon state penitentiary, over the sudden disappearance of one George Robertson, a one-year convict, who was on the trusty roll. Robertson decided that the penitentiary was not a proper place to celebrate the New Year, and, after carefully inspecting his wearing apparel, he became aware of the fact that a new suit of clothes would help his looks. Accordingly he appropriated a suit of belonging to Joe Cavanaugh and a watch belonging to Chas. Belt, one of the guards in the shop. He came to the city and was recognized by a number of persons who thought that his time had expired. But it was soon discovered that he had six weeks' work yet to do for the state. In the meantime Robertson sold the watch to James Smith and then proceeded to imbibe freely in the "nice of that sweet for-get-me-not."

As soon as it was discovered that Robertson had taken a move, Supt. Downing put a number of men out after him, and although some diligent work was done, he was sharp enough to elude the officers until this morning about 7:40, when he was captured by C. W. Gonor, one of the guards at the penitentiary. Robertson intended leaving the city this morning if he had not been captured. The authorities are led to believe that the fellow's mind is unbalanced, else he would not have committed such a rash act, with only a few days yet to serve. When captured this morning he was perfectly calm, and on being told that he must go back to the prison he never returned a word, but consented. He staid all last night at an Indian camp near the depot.

BAD ON 'EM.—The good brother of the Albany Democrat says: "There is a man in Albany who threatens to sell all his property here, on account of high taxes, and move to Tacoma. Some one should stop him, whoever he is. That would be terrible, though it really is unfair for our citizens to be obliged to pay the present enormous taxes. Seven mills, think of that. In Seattle they are only 37 mills, and in Tacoma about 35 mills. Even in Portland they are not over 25 mills; but here in Albany they are 7 mills! A man tells us that in the Eastern city where he came from, run almost as well as Albany, the taxes were only 50 mills, and he knew of one city where they got as low as 100 mills. Albany people certainly have reason to complain, and the Democrat particularly feels sorry for the old resident here who has to see an electric light at his corner slowly burning out \$12.50 worth of electricity every month, just to light the city, and against his wishes."
