ARRESTED ON SUSPICION.

A Stranger Arrested on Suspicion as Being the Person Who Rifled Gas Schreiber's Safe.

"Ever since the safe robbery, which occurred on last Thursday night, the city marshal and his police force have been doing considerable work trying to locate the 'operator thereof.' Several persons have been 'shadowed,' and yesterday about 10:30 Marshal Ross thought that he had evidence enough to warrant him to arrest a stranger who is now being tried in the police courts.

The man arrested is a handsome, and strong looking Scotchman, and as the saying goes "no one's fool." He looks to be a man of some 25 or 30 years of age and his countenance would indicate anything else than of a safe blower.

A JOURNAL reporter held a short interview with the stranger this afternoon, and he claimed that he could prove that he did not arrive in the city until Friday at 11 o'clock, on the train from Portland, that he remained in the city up to Sunday, and intended to take the morning train for Albany and go from Albany to Yreka, and take the steamer for San Francisco, and as soon as he learned of there being no morning train, he hired a team of Minto & Low and was going to drive to Albany. This action looked strange, of course, and was the main cause in the authorities in arresting him.

This evening about 3 o'clock, C. A. Reed, who arrived in the city on the same train Friday, from Southern Kansas, hearing about the trouble, went around to see if he could recognize the man arrested. As soon as he laid eyes on him he said that he would swear the man came to Salem on Friday morning's train and farther stated that he was acquainted with the stranger whose register in the hotel book reads as J. B. Patterson, when he traveled for a hardware house throughout Kansas.

The trial is now going on and the outcome cannot be surmised at this writing. If the man is guilty he does not show it.
