City Council Meeting.

The first meeting of the new year was held by Salem's city council and officers last night.

The following standing committees were announced by Mayor Williams for the current year.

Ways and Means—Collins, Hirsch and Bush.

Ordinances—Hirsch, Edes and Hutton.

Accounts and Current Expenses—Bush, Collins and Hutton.

Licenses—Gray, Lafore and Edes.

Fire and Water—Hutton, Strang and Bush.

Streets and Public Property—Lafore, Strang and Gray.

Health and Police—Edes, Gray and Collins.

Printing—Strang, Lafore and Hirsch.

In his annual message the Mayor said our city's financial condition was not as good as he could wish for, stating that our bonded indebtedness is: bridge bonds, \$30,000; sewer bonds, \$19,000, and school bonds, \$16,000, besides a floating debt of about \$6000, making a total interest bearing debt of about \$75,000.

Mayor Williams gave some sound advice concerning the condition of the streets, and what should be done to further improve them. He also recommends a further extension of our city and fire limits.

The owning of the water works by the city was recommended, and that the legislature be asked for permission to further bond the city for that purpose.

The finance committee reported that the following bills be allowed: Land & Bush, \$24.00; M. E. Goode, 5.00; Smith & Robinson, 20.00; S. Farrar & Co., 5.25; Capital Journal, 23.00; B. F. Drake, 28.75; Doll, Nichols, 6.50; L. Biakely, 25.00.

The street committee reported favorably for all alley sewers in blocks 17, 20, 81 and 82; ordered that they be surveyed and bids for construction be advertised for, also that they be built at the expense of the property owners. Report approved.

The liquor license of Chris Paulus was on motion ordered transferred to Hodgins & Miller.

The alley running east and west through blocks 51 and 52, University addition, were referred to the proper committee.

Marshal Ross as chief of police recommended that our policemen be appointed for each ward, at a salary of \$75 per month. Referred.

The street committee apportioned the cost of sewer construction as follows, which the recorder was instructed to assess and collect.

The object is to build and operate a railway between the two points. The star milling company of McMinnville, principal office at McMinnville; Capital stock, \$14,000 with J. S. Higgo, W. C. Helmsy, David Stout and J. S. Marham as incorporators.
