THEOLOGICAL SCHOOL.

WHY SO DISSATISFIED?

What's the Matter With Hon. Louis Barin? "Oh He's All Right," Notwithstanding Certain Kicks.

When the Oregon delegation, after many weary hours of toil and careful examination of the different candidates for the various appointments of the state had completed their slate and with a relieved burden sent the result of their work out to the world, a gentle kick arose from certain quarters of the camp, and the following is one of the kicks, and here it may be said that all the kicks that have been made come from this very organ. Following is the article:

"A special dispatch from Washington to the 'Oregonian' announces that the Oregon delegation has agreed upon the recommendation for appointment by the president of Louis Barin for United States Marshal. This is a very poor decision. Barin is not fitted for the office, nor is he deserving of it. His geographical position is also wrong. He has never done anything whatever to merit such a high honor. He acted as a wooden Indian sign during a couple of campaigns, and afterwards shouldered the honor of carrying the 'best' to Salem Statesman. Why the Statesman should have committed itself to an unsolved question in some peoples' minds, but, simmering the whole thing down, the fact of the case is, the Statesman was trying to play a deep hand in making up this slate, but utterly failed to receive a recognition of its powerful way.

The Portland Times, of December the 24th, comments on the rushing editorial of the brethren as follows: "The Statesman is a red-eyed publican paper, and the above compliment to the late chairman of the state central committee is very refreshing. Had the state central committee had thought the same way the Statesman thinks, and pulled Barin off the perch before the last state election, many of the rank and file of the democracy would have felt very well pleased. For a wooden Indian, Barin did some very fair work; and as a wooden Indian he appears to have landed on the U. S. Marshal slate with both feet in very good shape. Just what kind of a wooden Indian he will make when he once gets his nippers on the office and qualifies, it would be interesting to know; but if he does as well as he has been doing since he first stood up for exhibition, it will be a pretty good thing for the republican party to go to working up all the basswood in the state, and place a wooden Indian of Barin's description in every county.

"They will need 'em to help carry the state next June." The truth of the matter is simply this, our neighbor supposed it was running the machine, and then instead of accepting the inevitable and letting itself down gracefully, had to show its bad blood by abusing all appointees it dared to.
