Artificial Emeralds.
The method by which Messrs. Hautefeuille and Perry have succeeded in producing very beautiful crystals of emerald has been described to the French Academy of Sciences. Silica, alumina and glucina (with traces of oxide of chromium) were fused with acid molybdate of lithia, a temperature of from 600 to 700 degrees being maintained for fifteen days. Crystals about one twenty-fifth of an inch in diameter, with the mineralogical and physical characteristics of the natural emerald, were obtained.
