

SOME IMMENSE THINGS.

A Few of the Great Marvels of Nature and Art.

The Largest of Every Thing in All Quarters of the Globe—An Interesting Compendium of Historical and Statistical Facts.

The highest mountain range is the Himalayas, the mean elevation being estimated at 15,000 feet.

The loftiest mountain is Mount Everest, or Gaurisankar, of the Himalaya range, having an elevation of 29,000 feet above the sea level.

The largest city in the world is London. Its population numbers 4,021,875 souls. New York, with a population of 1,550,000, comes fifth in the list of great cities.

The largest theater is the new opera-house in Paris. It covers nearly 2,000 acres of ground. Its cubic mass 4,357,000 feet. It cost \$1,000,000 francs.

The loftiest active volcano is Popocatepetl (Smoking mountain), thirty-five miles southwest of Puebla, Mex. It is 17,734 feet above the sea level, and has a crater three miles in circumference and 1,000 feet deep.

The largest island in the world—which is also regarded as a continent—is Australia. It is 2,950 miles in length from east to west and measures 1,950 miles from north to south. Its area is 2,934,287 square miles.

The largest span of wire in the world is used for a telegraph in India over the river Kistnah between Buzorah and Setauagram. It is more than 6,000 feet long, and is stretched between two hills, each of which is 1,300 feet high.

The largest ship in the world is the Great Eastern. She is 680 feet long, 63 feet broad and 60 feet deep, being 22,227 tons builder's, 18,915 gross and 13,344 net register. She was built at Millwall, on the Thames, and was launched January 31, 1872.

The largest university is Oxford, in England, in the city of the same name, fifty-five miles from London. It consists of twenty-one colleges and five halls. Oxford was a seat of learning as early as the time of Edward the Confessor. University College claims to have been founded by Alfred.

The largest body of fresh water on the globe is Lake Superior—400 miles long, 100 miles wide at its greatest breadth and having an area of 32,000 square miles. Its mean depth is said to be 600 and its greatest depth 1,300 fathoms. Its surface is about 65 feet above the level of the sea.

The most extensive park is Deer Park, in the environs of Copenhagen, in Denmark. The enclosure contains 4,200 acres, and is divided by a small river.

The largest pleasure ground in the United States is one of the largest in the world, is Fairmount Park, Philadelphia, which contains 2,400 acres.

The largest cavern is Mammoth Cave, in Edmonson County, Kentucky. It is near Green River, six miles from Cave City and about twenty-eight miles from Bowling Green. The cave consists of a succession of irregular chambers, some of which are large, situated on different levels. Some of these are traversed by navigable branches of the subterranean Lenoir river. Blind fish are found in its waters.

The longest tunnel of the world is that of St. Gothard, on the line of railroad between Lucerne and Milan. The summit of the tunnel is 900 feet below the surface at Andermatt and 600 feet beneath the peak of Katschhorn of the St. Gothard range. The tunnel is twenty-six and one-half feet in diameter, and is about 17,000 feet long. It is the longest of its kind in the world, and is a half-mile longer than the Mount Cenis tunnel.

The biggest trees in the world are the mammoth trees of California. One of a grove in Tulare County, according to measurement made by members of the State Geological Survey, was shown to be 275 feet high, 105 feet in circumference at base and seventy-six feet at a point twelve feet above the ground. Some of the trees are 380 feet high and thirty-five feet in diameter. Some of the largest that have been felled indicate an age of from 2,000 to 2,500 years.

The largest inland sea is the Caspian, lying between Europe and Asia. Its greatest length is 700 miles, its greatest breadth 500 miles, and its area 180,000 square miles. The Great Salt Lake in Utah may be properly termed an inland sea, and is nearly a mile long and has a varying breadth from twenty to thirty-five miles. Its surface is 4,100 feet above the sea, whereas the surface of the Caspian is eighty-four feet below the level of the ocean.

The largest Empire in the world is that of Great Britain, comprising 8,570,000 square miles—more than a sixth part of the land of the globe, and embracing nearly a third of the population of the world. In territorial extent the United States ranks third, containing 3,551,243 square miles, including Alaska. In population it ranks fourth, with 15,000,000 of people. Russia ranks second, having 8,532,940 square miles.

The highest mountain is the obelisk at Karnak, in Egypt. Karnak is on the east bank of the Nile, near Luxor, and occupies part of the site of ancient Thebes. The obelisk is ascribed to Hatshepsut, sister of Pharaoh Thothmes III., who reigned about 1600 B. C. Its whole length is 125 feet, and it weighs 400 tons. Its height without pedestal is 105 feet 10 inches. The height of the obelisk in Central Park, New York City, without pedestal, is 65 feet 11 inches, its weight about 102 tons.

The largest bell in the great bell of Moscow at the foot of the Kremlin. Its circumference at the bottom is nearly 63 feet and its height a little more than 21 feet. In its stoutest part it is 23 inches thick, and its weight has been computed to be 41,772 pounds. It has never been rung, and was probably cast on the spot where it now stands. A piece of the bell is broken off. The fracture is supposed to have been occasioned by water having been thrown upon it when heated by the building erected over it being on fire.

The greatest wall in the world is the Chinese Wall, built by the first Emperor of the Tsin dynasty, about 221 B. C., as a protection against Tartars. It traverses the northern boundary of China and is carried over the highest hills, through the deepest valleys, across rivers and every other natural obstacle. Its length is 1,500 miles. Including a parapet of five feet the total height of the wall is 20 feet; thickness at the base, 23 feet, and at the top, 15 feet. Towers or bastions occur at intervals of about 100 yards.

A variety of materials—such as sawdust, dry ashes, cork shavings, etc.—have been used under floors for deadening noise. A late French suggestion is the use for this purpose of wood shavings which have been dipped in thick whitewash. It is claimed that this substance has the advantages of being quite incombustible, an excellent conductor of sound, inexpensive, and of light weight when desired to be disinfected.
