LINE DOWN.—The telegraph lines south of here are not working south of Roseburg, and it is not known when there will be a train from the South. The engine express came down this morning on the overland's time, so there was no train for Portland at 12:45.

C. L. Keller & Sons returned last evening from Portland where they have been buying goods for their new furniture emporium, soon to be opened at the corner of Commercial and Chemeketa streets. Their goods will begin to arrive this evening, but it will be several days before their opening will be announced.

TO JEFFERSON.—This evening, quite a large number of the members of Capital Lodge I. O. G. T. will depart for Jefferson, where they will visit the Good Templars lodge of that city. The lodge at that place have made considerable preparation for their coming, and a good time will be had.

FOR HIMSELF.—Stephen Bach who has acted as head clerk at John Hughes' grocery store for sometime past, has signified his intention of resigning and will launch out in business for himself at Lebanon. Mr. Bach will establish a general store and carry a nice line of goods. He is a gentlemanly business man and will be a good addition to the city of Lebanon. It is rumored also, that Mr. Bach will soon investigate the doings of matrimony and may conduct the two businesses together. That's a correct idea, Stephen.

GRAND ARMY MATTERS.—The ninth annual encampment of the department of Oregon, Grand Army of the Republic, will assemble at Eugene, on Wednesday, February 12th. The annual convention of the Woman's Relief Corps will be held at Eugene at the same time. Comrade R. A. Crossan, of Sedgwick Post No. 10, is appointed as special aide to the A. A. G., to serve during the encampment. The ninth annual encampment promises to be one of the most interesting held in this state.

COMING.—On Wednesday evening, Jan. 29th, the Taylor family will appear at the opera house, under the auspices of the W. C. T. U. of this city. The Astorian says: The entertainment given by Taylors at Liberty Hall last evening under the auspices of the Y. M. C. A. attracted a fair audience notwithstanding the heavy rain. Mr. Taylor opened with his "Imperial Marching Band" song with banjo accompaniment which alone was worth the price charged for admission to the whole entertainment. His imitation of the "Chimes of Old Trinity" was perfect and his last piece of "Home Sweet Home" with variations was excellent and well received.

THE ISABELLE SUNK.—On Tuesday the little steamer Isabelle, sunk near Sellwood, after an eventful career. The Isabelle was built and launched from the foot of Ferry street, in this city in the fall of 1882 under the supervision of Peter Paquet. The boat was built for A. Prescott and was a light draught steamer, only drawing 16 inches of water and was used principally for towing logs and carrying on commerce on the upper Willamette during the low stage of water. There are many in the city who remember the time the boat was launched. A big time was had and the boat was crowded with Salemites as she slid down the gangway and took to the water like a duck.

THE MATTER SETTLED.—This morning the State street bridge question was settled by the county agreeing to take the matter in charge and build the bridge and the city agreeing to pay not to exceed \$225, as its share. The contract was let to Mr. McCoy, the celebrated bridge builder, and the bridge will be built as soon as possible. The bridge will be sixty-four feet in length and forty-six feet wide. The Electric railway will use ten feet on the South side, leaving a walk six feet wide on the north side, and a driveway, twenty-seven feet in width. The walk and the portion divided off for the electric line, will be separated from the driveway by a truss partition. The agreement was signed by the committee on streets and public property, who were given power to act by the last meeting of the city council.

DAYLIGHT ROBBERY.—One of the boldest robberies that has been reported in this city for sometime occurred yesterday at the meat market of Geo. Wilkins on Liberty street, just across mill creek. About 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon while Mr. Wilkins and several others were sitting around the stove in the back room of the shop some one entered and carried away the money drawer and all its contents. Mr. Wilkins in speaking with a JOURNAL reporter said, "yesterday while I and a number of others were in the back room of the shop sitting around the stove talking, a man entered and hid them the time of day. He then turned around with his back to them and stood for some little time looking out of the window and then left the shop. In about half an hour a customer came in and after supplying his wants I went to the money drawer to make change for him and discovered that it had been taken out. Search was at once instituted, the first thing to give any light on the subject was when some one asked Mrs. Geo. Neal who lived in the first house north of the shop, if she had seen any person pass that way with a box, and was informed that she had seen two men, just a few minutes before, go into the vacant lot where the old woolen mill used to stand, and throw away a box and then start on north. Going to the spot, I found the money drawer. I at once notified the officer, who went to work at once to catch the thief if possible." Mr. Wilkins thinks the man who came into the work room was watching, while the second party got away with the money, and as he knows the man well he is confident that the thief will be captured.

DEATH RESULTED.—On Monday the JOURNAL contained an article telling of the fifteen-year old son of J. Leabo, who lives near McMinnville, suffering from a severe attack of lockjaw. On Wednesday the poor lad died from the effects of the terrible suffering. Some two weeks ago, or so, the boy while lassoing a calf, became entangled in the rope, and in the struggle his arm was broken and badly mangled. The day was a cold one and before the lad could reach home, the arm was frozen, and the condition of the system not being good especially as the wound proved extremely painful and at last the boy was seized with the lockjaw. Everything was done to save the poor child's death and as a last resort on Tuesday evening, the arm was amputated above the elbow. The case was a peculiar one, and the parents of the boy are grief-stricken over the affair.

YOU BET SHE HAS.—The breezes seem rife with railroad gossip these days, and if Tillamook gets half the roads that are talked up she will have no reason to complain. The matter of a railroad from Albany via Tillamook to Astoria seems to be a foregoing conclusion, we all believe that project to be settled fact and that the early spring will witness lively times along said line, but the later fact is the Salem, Astoria & Eastern railroad and we have no doubt but a railroad from Salem to the sea will be a grand scheme for Salem. California is supplying us with a great part of our produce, which is quickly taken upon arrival. A few Oregon eggs are coming in in odd lots at 45 to 50 cents. The wheat market is in a state of inactivity, with little demand for cargoes. Quotations, \$1.20 @ \$1.22 1/2 for valley or Walla Walla.

Locomotives vs. Storms.

A correspondent of the Northwestern Railroad advances some odd theories to account for the frequency and severity of storms in modern times. He gives the figures to prove that there are now over 30,000 locomotives in actual use in the United States, besides the hundreds of thousands of stationary engines of all kinds and sizes. From a round 30,000 locomotives he estimates as much as 53,000,000,000 cubic yards of vapor each week, over 7,000,000,000 cubic yards a day, all to be returned as rain—"quite enough," he says, "to produce a good rain-storm every 24 hours." He estimates other engines of all kinds at 180,000, probably a very low estimate, and concludes that these, with the locomotives, send about 470,000,000,000 yards of vapor into the air every seven days. "Is it not enough," he asks, "to give us floods of terror?" Hundreds of gas wells sending their poison into the atmosphere; millions of cesspools and sewers. Would it be any wonder if some blighting plague would lay waste the land?
