A NEW W. C. T. U.

**The National Non-Partisan Temperance Organization.**  
CLEVELAND, Jan. 24.—The new ladies' temperance organization has adopted the name of Non-Partisan Women's Christian Temperance Union. It was decided upon, despite the objection of the minority, who thought the name too long, and besides, wanted something entirely distinctive from the old organization. The election of officers was then proceeded with, the following being the result:  
Miss F. Jennie Doty, Cleveland, general secretary; Mrs. Florence Miller, Des Moines, recording secretary; Miss E. J. Shortledge, Pennsylvania, financial secretary; Mrs. C. Cornelia Alford, Brooklyn, N. Y., treasurer. Heads of the five departments were selected, as follows: Evangelistic secretary, Mrs. Mary J. Aldrich, of Iowa; educational secretary, Mrs. Joseph D. Weeks, of Pennsylvania; legislative secretary, Mrs. Lydia H. Tilton, of the District of Columbia; literary work, Mrs. Florence Porter, of Oldtown, Me.; young women's work, Mrs. J. R. Webster, of Illinois.  
At the request of Mrs. Aldrich, of Iowa, and Mrs. Gore, of Pennsylvania, circulars will be issued showing the difference between this organization and the old Third-Party W. C. T. U.

The following resolution sets forth the cardinal principle of the new order:

We fully and freely recognize the right of every member of this organization to individual religious and political opinions and preferences, and their exercise according to the individual's conscience, and declare that no majority in such organization should ever in any manner interfere with these individual rights. We gladly recognize the fact that the non-partisan principles of Christian temperance work are rapidly gaining adherents throughout the nation. We want all the strength of the united Christian women of the Union to be brought against the combined power of the liquor traffic. We cordially invite the auxiliary-ship of all state and local organizations under our broad banner of political freedom, where every woman, whatever her party preferences or individual party work, may unite with us in efforts against the common enemy of the home, the state and the nation.

CONDENSED TELEGRAMS.

Mr. Spurgeon's health is improved.  
Four Prinevill hunters killed 191 jack rabbits in one day.  
The markets remain unchanged in the great centers of trade.  
The snow is being melted by rains and more disasters by floods await California.  
A dispute about fisheries is causing angry feelings between England and France.  
Nellie Bly reached New York today at 4 p. m. closing her trip around the world on time in 75 days.  
The brother of the archbishop of Naples, Italy, has absconded with \$120,000 of Catholic church money.  
The commissioners in session at Portland have fixed the county taxes for the current year at 18.2 mills.  
Reports from Northern Nevada state that cattle are dying at an alarming rate from the effects of the severe storm.  
The Union Pacific railroad track through the Blue and Cascade mountains is in worse condition than it has ever been known to be.  
Tacoma merchants complain of a discrimination of two cents a gallon on oil in favor of Portland, by the Standard Oil company.  
The Seattle brick layers are still out on a strike. Some were getting \$6 a day for nine hours and the new scale was \$5 for eight hours.  
The money men of Brazil have confidence in the New republic. A national bank stock to the amount of \$100,000,000 was subscribed for in a day.

Harvey Bond, of Halsey, an old time student of Willamette is spending a few days visiting among the students.  
The regular examinations took place yesterday in all the classes. From the cheerful faces seen on the previous examination when the standings were announced, one would infer that several had reached the required 95 per cent and were excused from the examination.  
The agent will be in the president's office at 8 o'clock Monday to receipt for tuition. Several new students will enter school Monday morning, and everything points to a full school the coming term.

The two young ladies of the Women's college who have been kept out of school for several days on account of sickness will re-enter Monday.

The Salem State Democrat has this to say of the dominant party in Oregon: "The republican party of this state is well drilled and organized, and its leaders are men of intelligence and experience, and it is folly and useless to undertake to cope with such a political organization in the coming campaign without organization and putting the old democratic party in shape for battle."  
Property valuations have been on a steady raise since the settlement of Oregon. This is but natural. But particularly, as with other cities, the raise has been more marked and rapid in this vicinity. The advance was more slow up to about five years ago, when rapid strides were made. Former prices have been more than doubled within the past five years, and in many cases suburban and city property has more than quadrupled in that time.—Oregon Viaductor.
