THE COMING STATE FAIR.

The State Agricultural Board Meet and Arrange a New Programme—a few Changes Made.

Saturday evening the State Board of Agriculture for Oregon, met at Secretary Gregg's office in pursuant to a call, and arranged the following racing programme. There were present at the meeting: President J. T. Apperson, Chief Marshal T. G. Richardson, Vice-president M. Wilkins, T. L. Davidson, R. E. Bybee, John G. Wright, D. H. Looney and Secretary J. T. Gregg.

The main object of the meeting was to arrange the speed programme and also to consider several changes which are noted below. The officers express their opinion that the coming fair will be an important one and will be the most successful of any previous one. Following is the programme as revised and agreed upon:

Race No. 1, trotting—3:00 class, best three in five, for all horses bred and owned in Washington and Oregon. Purse, \$400.

No. 2, trotting—Breeder's stake, for two-year-olds, best two in three. Entrance \$40, \$250 added.

No. 3, trotting—2:50 class, best three in five. Purse, \$400.

No. 4, trotting—Three-year-old class best two in three. Entrance \$50, \$300 added.

No. 5, trotting—2:22 class, best three in five. Purse \$500.

No. 6, trotting—2:25 class, best three in five. Purse \$500.

No. 7, trotting—2:30 class, best three in five. Purse \$400.

No. 8, running—Breeder's stake for two-year-olds, three-fourths mile dash. Entrance \$50, \$250 added.

No. 9, running—One and one-fourth miles. Purse \$600.

No. 10, running—Oregon Derby for three-year-olds, one and one-half miles. Entrance \$50, \$300 added.

No. 11, running—One mile and a sixteenth. Purse \$500.

No. 12, running—Three-fourths of a mile dash. Purse, \$500.

No. 13, running—Handicap, five-eighths of a mile dash. Purse, \$300.

No. 14, running—Handicap one mile. Purse, \$400.

In the trotting purse races nominations name and close Sept. 1st, with full ten per cent. entrance.

In the running purse races nominations name and close Sept. 1st with full ten per cent. entrance.

In the breeders' stakes for two and three year olds, both trotting and running, nominations and one-half of entrance, May 1st, and second payment, and balance of entrance July 1st.

In division C, sheep, a new class was added for cross bred animals. Sheep entitled to compete in this class must be a cross between pure French bred merino and pure bred American merino.

The class, draft horses, was divided into three classes. "Percheron," "Englishshires" and "Clydesdales." As the term of J. L. Wilson on the executive committee had expired, T. L. Davidson was elected to fill the vacancy. The following resolution was passed by the board to show the appreciation they had for Pomona grange, of this county, who had expressed a willingness to assist in making a creditable exhibit of agricultural products at the coming state fair:

Resolved, That the thanks of this board are hereby tendered to the Marion county Pomona grange for their proposition to aid this board in making exhibits of grains, grasses, fruits and vegetables that will be creditable to the agricultural resources of the state, and we cheerfully extend to the said Pomona further thanks for their interest in this branch of our work and tender to them any space in the pavilion they may need or other recognition that we can grant.

THE U. T. SLUM CORPS.—Mrs. Booth, of the Salvation Army, has organized what she calls "The Slum Corps." This missionary work has special reference to the babies and young children of the very poorest and most depraved class. The men and women composing this organization, go into the highways, by-ways, and gutters, into the holes and corners, into the rooms where drunken husbands beat their dying wives, and where drunken mothers forget their cold and hungry children and their shrieking, suffering infants. "The Slum Corps" looks out for these forlorn little ones, and uses every influence to redeem the parents. A great effort is now being made to establish a home where sick and neglected children can be taken care of, and where mothers who are trying to earn an honest dollar can place them while they do, or try to do. No more practical charity was ever planned.

THE MILL ACCEPTED.

The Trustees of the Woolen Mill Fund Accept the Mills and Recommend the Full Payment.

Yesterday evening the trustees of the Woolen Mill fund called at the Woolen Mills and made a careful examination of the mills and noted fully as to whether the same had been constructed and placed in operation according to contract. The examination was perfectly satisfactory and the trustees publish the following statement over their signatures.

FULLY COMPLIED WITH.

We, the undersigned Trustees of the Woolen Mill Fund, hereby report that we have examined the woolen mill erected by Mr. Thomas Kay and his associates, and that in our judgment he has fully complied with the conditions of the contract whereby he was to receive a subsidy of \$20,000 from the citizens of Salem, and we would urge that all unpaid subscriptions be paid at once, so as to enable the trustees to comply with the obligations resting upon them.

This morning a JOURNAL reporter interviewed one of the trustees, and he said in the course of conversation that all of the \$20,000 subsidy had been paid, with the exception of about \$3000, which would now be promptly paid, as those who subscribed this amount have only been holding back, awaiting the report of the trustees. The subsidy has been paid with a willingness and cheerfully. Each payment has been made promptly, and it is pleasant to note the fact that Salem possesses such liberal hearted and enterprising citizens.

In talking with one of the subscribers to the \$20,000 subsidy, he said "I subscribed a few dollars to that fund and am proud of it. Were I afforded the same opportunity to-morrow I would do just as I did when this amount was raised. I think that Salem wants manufactures much more than anything else, and I for one am in favor of having them here. I can tell you one thing, it would not be many months that Salem need make special efforts for these enterprises if she will only push ahead now. They will seek this place without any inducement if the proper interest is worked up."

The JOURNAL must congratulate the citizens who have paid this subsidy and also congratulate the city in obtaining such a model of an institution as the new woolen mill plant will prove to be as soon as it is in full operation. It will be a pride to the city.
