No action will be taken until the end of the week, when the weather will be in better shape.

Roberts, who has been in the business here for the past four years, and C. S. McNally, also an experienced architect, late of San Francisco, and Los Angeles. They will continue the office at 132 State street and are now open for business.

DECLARED INSANE.—Granville Wagner, who was taken out of a flooded house Tuesday almost dead, was on Wednesday brought before Judge Shaw on charge of insanity. Drs. Byrd and Smith were the examining physicians. He admitted to the use of 20 to 30 grains of opium daily, as a result he has become a helpless imbecile. He is a molder by trade, a good workman, and has worked in Drake's foundry for ten years, but is now a total wreck mentally and physically. The verdict was, insane from excessive use of opium.

DEBRIS FROM THE FLOOD.

The Aftercrop of Flood Items Gathered From the Rapidly Subiding Waters.

Miles and miles of fence has been washed away on Mission bottom. The loss in this line alone will be great.

A. LaFollette, of Mission bottom, lost 50 head of good hogs in the flood. The price which pork is selling at now makes it a big loss.

Dr. J. H. Smith, the dentist, owned a barn until the flood, and this barn stood on the alley between Trade and Ferry, and Liberty and High streets. It is gone now, that is, it is overturned and in a delapidated condition. The doctor has had a rough experience with his barn. Twice it has burned down to the ground and now a flood comes along and takes it away.

Mr. J. F. Anderson, of Switzerland, reports a 300-foot bridge gone on the road to Silverton from his place. He reports the condition of wheat as very fine. It is growing beautifully and he can see nothing to prevent a good crop.

N. H. Looney, of near Jefferson, tells us that the flood did not do much damage there beyond wrecking the railroad bridge. The Green bridge two miles above town, still stands. There has been terrible destruction of property on the low bottoms but no lives lost.

Word comes from J. B. Putnam, who is over in Polk county, on his place that Polk county is all afloat and that he has lost seven or eight thousand feet of lumber. He says further that water is four feet deep at his house.

NEAR MEHAMA.

The JOURNAL is indebted to County Clerk Babcock for the following information from up near Mehama. The Marion Taylor, Don Smith and the Mehama bridges are all right. The small bridge north on the Mehama road over Stout creek is still standing but singular to relate the creek has cut out a new channel and is running entirely on the other side of the bridge, leaving it standing high and dry. The damage is not so great as was first expected in that district.

FROM HOWELL PRAIRIE.

A gentleman just in from Howell prairie states that the bridge across Pudding river in district 45 is washed away and in the same district, sixty feet of the bridge near J. Bowers is gone out. Bridges along this river are badly demoralized.

The bridge on the county road between Grier's and Wm. Claggett's is washed out leaving the road almost impassable.

ACROSS THE WAY.

Dr. Geo. Wright, the popular McMinville dentist, arrived in the city this morning. He in company with Dr. Nelson of the same place left McMinville and run to Dairy on a hand-car and made their way to Salem under difficulty. Dr. Wright informs a reporter that Gaston is afloat and that Sheridan is situated in three feet of water. The Sheridan bridge still remains, but it is afloat and in a bad condition. A joke is going the rounds that the water at that place is salty owing to the McMinville gap being so low; South Yamhill has lost their wagon bridge, and the bents from under the railroad bridge have been washed away, leaving the bridge in a weakened condition.

Water is well up in the Dayton warehouse and several thousand bushels of wheat will be damaged.

The Rickreal bridge has been swept away and no trace of it is left.

AT THE DEPOT.

Section Boss Prunty informed a JOURNAL reporter this forenoon that the bridge just south of the depot would be completely repaired to-night. A large force of men are at work on the washout just south of the depot, and from appearance, repairs will make it safe for trains to-morrow during the day. How much work is to be done about these we were not able to ascertain.

BRIDGE BENEFIT.

To-night the Russell-Jewell dramatic company appear at Reed's opera house in "My Geraldine." One-half the proceeds are to go toward the bridge fund. The Salem band boys have generously offered their services free of charge and will parade the streets this evening in the interest of the affair. Seats on sale at Patton's and Dearborn's.

NO MAILS YET.—The only mail that is coming to Salem now, is from Silverton. So far that plucky carrier, Mr. Crawford has made this point every day as regularly as a clock. Postmaster Gilbert intends to accompany the accumulated mail to Portland this morning via boat, if it had gone down as expected last evening. But this morning the boat men thought best not to undertake the trip for a few days. It is barely possible Salem will not be in receipt of any mail before Monday at least, though every effort is being made to get the road in shape as soon as possible.

AT THE COURT HOUSE.

What the Officials are Doing—Preparing for Circuit Court—The Sheriff Collecting Taxes.

Thinking that perhaps a number of the JOURNAL's readers would be interested to know what was going on at the county court house at this time of the year, a JOURNAL reporter was designated this morning to pay that institution a visit, and interviewed the obliging officials.

Captain Babcock, county clerk, with the assistance of his deputies, D. C. Sherman and L. E. Pratt, are looking after the office duties and commissioners' court, which is in session. This gives them all the work they can well handle and not many idle moments are spent in this important office. Next week circuit court will convene and then they will, as usual, have an over abundance of work to look after.

Recorder Starr, reports everything quiet in his department, especially has this been the case for the past week, but, said he: "Business is looking up this morning and the usual amount of transfers are looked for with the beginning of the next week."

County Supt., of schools, D. W. Yoder, was found at his desk this morning busy answering private correspondence. Said he: "I have been visiting schools throughout the county and the flood caught me at Silverton, where I was water-bound for several days. No, there is nothing of any great importance going on around this department at the present time."

County court is in progress but no special, important business is being done, as Commissioner Grimm is absent owing to the high water. Judge Shaw and the remainder of the court are busy looking after road matters etc. County Treasurer Condit is having an opportunity to read up on important law points just now as business around his office has been much more animated than it was for the past few days. A placard was posted up on his office door this morning and written upon it in bold letters were the words: "Gone to Canada," this was misleading and was a cruel joke on our worthy treasurer.

The reporter next called at the sheriff's department where he found Sheriff Croisan busy looking after the collection of taxes. Said he: "These rains and floods have been working hard against us, but so far, by great efforts we have made every date as specified. Deputy Wrightman was at Aurora yesterday. We got him there by buggy and the drive was not a pleasant one to contemplate. He will make Hubbard to-day, Woodburn on Friday, Gervais on Saturday and will finish the rounds at Turner on the 15th, should nothing prevent. No, taxes are not coming in as fast as they would if the flood had not come on. It has been the means of keeping many from meeting the collector. Next week will be a busy week with us."

The Goddess of Liberty which stands proudly on the tower of the building was not interviewed, as a glance from below was sufficient to show that she was busy as ever weighing out justice to all, and the sword at her side remains stationary, which would signify that "All is well."
