NARROW ESCAPE.—Senator Hatch, of McCoy, Polk county, who is in the city visiting his sick mother, informs a CAPITAL JOURNAL reporter of a serious mishap near Amity last Saturday, which resulted in the loss of two horses and almost that of two men. It appears George Dixon and a man named Martin had hired a livery team at Amity for the purpose of driving to McMinnville. A short distance from Amity they came to a bridge the approach to which was covered with water, but not so deep as to endanger travel. They drove on all right and did not notice that the other end of the bridge had been swung around out of place, until they drove off into ten feet of rushing water. Both horses were drowned and the two occupants of the buggy narrowly escaped with their lives. It was an exceedingly close call.

IS IT DAMAGED?—A serious question has arisen that cannot be determined until the river reaches a stage several feet lower than it is at present writing. The water works obtain their supply of water through a crib or purifier that is situated quite a distance out in the river, and during this flood a tremendous current has swept over it and the question has arisen whether or not this arrangement has been more or less damaged or swept away. It is barely possible that it was strong enough to withstand all the pressure brought to bear upon it. Manager Martin says that just as soon as possible an investigation will be made and if any damages have been done workmen will be set to work to make the needed repairs.
