produce the information.AN UNJUST PRACTICE.  
We take this from a Pendleton  
paper's report of district court pro-  
ceedings:A motion to instruct the jury to  
return a verdict of "not guilty" in  
the John Koch case was allowed by  
the judge, and the jury decided the  
case without leaving the court room.  
Technicality in the testimony was  
the cause of his discharge, the evi-  
dence given for the prosecution by  
an accomplice not being corroborated  
as required by law. Koch had  
already spent six months in the  
county jail, waiting for trial. He  
joyfully resumed his old trade of  
sausage-making on being released.The constitution of the United  
States guarantees every citizen the  
right of a speedy public trial. If  
Mr. Koch had been a rich man he  
would not have lain in jail for six  
months, only to be discharged on a  
formal verdict of "not guilty."That the evidence was from an ac-  
complice was probably as well  
known to the public prosecutor and  
court when the man was imprison-  
ed as now.

Then why this injustice?

ELDRIDGE.—At his home, at St.  
Louis, Oregon, Friday evening at  
11 o'clock, Mr. F. E. Eldridge,  
aged 64 years.GERVAIS, Oregon, Feb. 1st.—Hon.  
F. E. Eldridge died at his residence  
last night at eleven o'clock. He  
was conscious up to the time of his  
death. The funeral will take place  
at St. Louis, Monday, Feb. 3d, at  
ten o'clock in the morning.The first tidings of the death of  
this highly respected and beloved  
man was received at the JOURNAL  
office early this morning, and all  
his many friends when apprized of  
the death bowed their heads in  
solemn submission. Mr. Eldridge  
was born in Pennsylvania in 1827,  
and came to Oregon about the year  
1849 and settled near Parkersville.  
He leaves a devoted wife and sev-  
eral children to mourn his death.The deceased was in very good  
health until he went east of the  
mountains some time ago where he  
contracted a severe cold, that settled  
on his lungs, and has gradually  
grown worse until death claimed  
him a victim.Mr. Eldridge was widely ac-  
quainted throughout the state and  
especially in Salem and Marion  
county.He was married soon after he  
came to Oregon to a daughter of  
Hugh Cosgrove and then removed  
to the homestead where he resided  
up to the time of his death.Below are a few sentiments from  
those who were acquainted with the  
deceased.J. Q. Wilson.—Have been person-  
ally acquainted with Mr. Eldridge  
since 1853. He was living at Park-  
ersville, and was engaged in the  
milling business with Wm. Parker  
when I first became acquainted  
with him. I remember the time  
well when he traded lumber for the  
ground on Commercial street where  
the new brick buildings now stand,  
that have just been erected by him.  
He hauled the lumber from Parkers-  
ville himself. He was a fine man,  
and was well respected by both  
political parties, being a staunch  
democrat himself. I am very sorry  
to hear of his death.Hon. A. Bush.—I first formed the  
acquaintance of Mr. Eldridge in  
1850. He has always been a man  
prominent among his neighbors, a  
good citizen, and a moral man in  
every sense of the word. He pos-  
sessed a considerable degree of intel-  
ligence, and has been notably con-  
nected in county affairs all his life,  
serving as justice of the peace, and  
being several times a candidate on  
the minority ticket, for state offices.  
His death is to be deeply regretted  
by all, as he was an enterprising  
man. His death will prove a loss  
for Salem.Hon. T. C. Shaw.—Mr. Eldridge  
has been identified with French  
Prairie for the past forty years. He  
began his career with little or no  
money. He was a man of great en-  
terprise and a money maker by his  
own energy. He believed in the  
future prosperity of Salem and at  
different times invested in Salem  
real estate. He has just had erected  
some brick buildings that are a  
credit to our city. I am very sorry  
to hear of Mr. Eldridge's death.
