AN AGONISTIC WELL-ANSWERED.

The Oregonian's well known leaning toward agnosticism sometimes leads it almost to the verge of inhumanity. This weakness of a great paper is picked up and answered by the Catholic Sentinel as follows: "A selfish, inferior or depraved nature cannot understand or appreciate the heroism of that absolute self-renunciation inspired by Christian teaching which surrenders even life itself in the alleviation of human suffering. But one would scarcely expect even such morbid natures to 'censure a self-abnegation that leads to possibilities so grave.' Yet we are assured by the editor of the Oregonian, in referring to the sacrifice of Sister Rose Gertrude, that the thought of a voluntary adjournment among a colony of lepers 'exalts human selfishness that forbids such a fate above the unselfishness that exposes a clean, wholesome physical organization to the taint of its loathsome condition.' After this we are prepared for the statement that 'True humanity' points to 'a more merciful and efficient way of ministering to the victims' of revolting disease, and this 'merciful and efficacious' way is that they be dealt with 'as the inferior animals hopelessly afflicted now are in all civilized communities.' In other words, they may be treated like an old spayed horse, shot or turned out to die. Instead of hospitals for the lepers, this human philanthropist would have slaughter houses on an improved plan. This was the convenient method of treating old, useless, or diseased slaves, or deformed infants, in vogue in pagan Rome and Greece. This is the 'merciful and efficacious' way of 'ministering' to poor unfortunate incurably afflicted with loathsome disease, pointed out by the philosophy of selfishness and brutality, a solution of the problem worthy of the Oregonian. If the time ever comes, as the Oregonian earnestly hopes, when mental aberration, as well as physical torture, are dealt with in the summary and 'humane' manner, the instinct of self-preservation and protection would doubtless impel the editor to reform his opinions.

NOT TECHNICALLY RIGHT.

There are a number of democratic papers who do not uphold the course of the democrats in congress in opposing the new rules and Speaker Reed.

The Eagle, a well-known democratic Journal of Brooklyn, N. Y., thinks the house of representatives ought to have power to proceed with business, and therefore it does not approve the course of the democratic minority in congress. Says the Eagle: "It would seem to be a rudimentary and essential power of a deliberative body to decide whether it is present for business. If such a decision is at the momentary mercy of a few members through a technical falsehood, the possibilities of obstruction are unlimited."

United States Senator Washburn,

of Minnesota, said in Chicago the other day: "There is not likely to be any issue made on Reed's recent rulings in the house. He was entirely consistent. Everyone familiar with legislation in Washington knows the house rules were practically the worst possible. At any time two or three men could and did stop legislation. Reed has advocated a change for years. As soon as the rules are settled the house will probably frame a tariff bill on the lines of the senate bill of last session, and it will be passed without much change."

THE FAST MAIL.

The Pacific coast papers are filled with complaints at the slow mails, and the inadequate mail service that the North Pacific coast is furnished with. Many severe criticisms are indulged in.

We have before us the St. Louis Republic of Feb. 16th, this morning the 20th. It comes via the fast mail over the Union Pacific. Allowing for some delay at each end of the line, it must appear to anyone that this is remarkable time, in which to cover that vast stretch, over two thirds of the continent and over several great chains of mountains. The same kind of fast time is made from New York to Portland and return.

While complaining at the many shortcomings of the service we should not forget to be grateful for our one and only grand transcontinental mail route. For its arrangement most credit is due to General J. S. Clarkson of Iowa.

To obtain this result, the present mode of electing senators by the legislature has been of late years manipulated by money or other reward.

SELLING PRICES.
The only change in the market quotations noticeable this week is in eggs. They have fallen from 25 cents per dozen to 18 and 20 cents with a continued downward tendency.

There is very little green stuff being shipped in just at present, such as cabbage, lettuce and greens. A few days of warm sunshine will note a full arrival, however, of all early spring vegetables.

There is a dull depression noticeable in the grain market. No wheat is being offered and as it will be some time before warehouses can be placed in a receding condition for grain no change for the better can hardly be expected. The Salem Flouring Mills company expect to commence grinding again on Monday after a shut down of several weeks, made necessary by the high waters.

Their damaged flume is fully repaired and workmen are busy putting in a more substantial dam in place of the old one that was washed away. They will be ready to receive wheat inside of ten days.

Poultry is commanding a good round price as well as live stock.
