LIVELY SCENE.

The Capital Lumber Company Rushing Business-A Large Force of Men at Work.

This morning a JOURNAL reporter in making the rounds of the city, visited the yards of the Capital Lumber mills, at the foot of Ferry and Trade streets.

A large force of men are busily engaged in cleaning up the yards from the tumble-down state in which they were left after the flood. The company can certainly congratulate themselves over the small loss by their recent fresher. Outside of the loss of a few hundred feet of timber and a small amount of belting, the loss will be light, and in less than ten days time the mill will be running at its full capacity.

The steamer Modoc arrived yesterday from the logging camps, bringing in tow about 100,000 feet of logs for the mills. The steamer, under the direct charge of Capt. Jim Smith, will be engaged in this service for the next two months, and expects to make daily trips, each time bringing not less than 100,000 feet of material. Manager Moore said this morning: "We have a force of some 20 odd men at work now and just as soon as possible will start up with the intention of turning out about 35,000 feet of lumber per day. We were not able to supply the demand last year owing to the fact that we were utterly unable to secure logs, but this cause has been remedied this season and it is our intention to supply the large trade we have without being compelled to ship lumber in here." The starting up of the mills is hailed with delight throughout the city. The pay roll for labor amounts to something near \$500 a week, all of which succeeds in pushing the town onward.

FAULTY ASSESSMENTS.-A glance at some of the assessment rolls returned to the state from the different counties reveals some very loose work and points to the necessity for more care in the selection of assessors, whereby none but the most competent men shall be chosen, and to the need of the supervising authorities being careful to see that the books are in correct and proper shape before they are placed in the hands of collecting officers, as there can be no forced collections unless the manner of listing property laid down in the statute is followed as closely as possible. In Lane county, for instance, the real estate is not described in a single instance, but is assessed by precincts, and a certain number of acres set opposite the owner's name, without sectional description or by metes and bounds or any other manner by which to locate it, notwithstanding the fact that section 2770 of the code expressly lays down the form to be followed. Not an acre of those lands could be sold for taxes, nor could the county give any title thereunder. There are many other discrepancies in the assessment roll of Lane county as well as in that of several other counties, an examination of which will be very suggestive of reform to the next legislature. In this connection it is but just to say that the Marion county list is one of the best arranged and most intelligible of the whole state, being characterized by clearness, neatness and accuracy.

A Duel Between Intellectual Giants. Mr. Collins is sanguine over the coming building boom, this spring. Last year he turned out over 1,500,000 brick, and to-day his yard is entirely clean and he fell behind on his contract over 3000 brick. He will have all his brick made by contract this season, instead of employing labor.
