FARM AND HOME.

In destroying the robins which have been driven out of the mountains by the snow, the orchardists and vineyardists should not go to excess. At this time of year too many robins may be too much, but at other seasons they are valuable, for they feed on insects and pests that eat foliage and destroy fruit.

Geo. Q. Dow, of Rockingham county, N. Y. says in his report. Bubaeh No. 3 is the king berry today, ahead of all others every way, a good producer of strong vigorous plants, and an immense producer of tremendous berries. I predict that this variety will predominate all over the country. It does well everywhere, on high or low land, east or west, and it yields the biggest fruit of any strawberry growing. It also produces lots of them, and the last picking is as big as the first.

There was probably never a time when the farmers and wage-workers of this country were more thoroughly aroused to the fact that they are not obtaining their just share of the rewards of labor than at the present. Legislation will not cure all the ills that agriculture is heir to, but it can do much. The necessary legislation can be easily obtained, if the farmers will only unite. That is the hard part of it.
