paying \$5 each for the ride. But

dise, the Willamette valley.

MONMOUTH NOTES.—Glancing  
over the Monmouth Democrat, it is  
discovered that: Monmouth wants  
and needs a hotel; that the city  
council has ordered a number of  
street lamps to throw light on the  
thriving little city; that a gentle-  
man from Michigan is correspond-  
ing with parties with a view to put-  
ting up a flouring mill there; that  
the net assessment of the town is  
\$105,230.

A HANDSOME RESIDENCE.—Harry  
A. Thomas is receiving bids for  
the construction of an elegant new  
ten room residence on his property  
at the corner of Winter and Mill  
streets. The residence, when com-  
pleted, will cost something like  
\$4000, and will be a model structure  
in every particular. In the spring  
he expects to have built a barn that  
for convenience and beauty will be  
unsurpassed by any in the city.

AT THE PENITENTIARY.—Dr. W.  
D. Jeffries, the prison physician,  
stated to a JOURNAL reporter yester-  
day, that the health of the pris-  
oners at the penitentiary was splen-  
did. Only two patients are now in  
the hospital, where there are usually  
from six to eight. The first case of  
foot-burning that has occurred for  
some time happened accidentally  
the first of the week, by which a  
couple of prisoners sustained slight  
burns.

TO DOUGLAS COUNTY.—A party  
consisting of W. G. Steel, C. M.  
Idleman and others, of Portland,  
and Dr. J. M. Keene, of this city,  
will take this evening's train for  
Drain, Douglas county. In the vic-  
inity of which the company of  
which these gentlemen are members  
has some extensive and valuable  
land interests. Important develop-  
ments in that region may be looked  
for in the near future. The party  
will return Monday.

FOR THE BRIDGE.—The Mon-  
mouth Democrat says to its Polk  
county readers: "One of the ques-  
tions that is now before the people  
of Polk county is: bridge or no  
bridge. The citizens of Salem offer  
all their strength and considerable  
capital in assisting to span the Wil-  
lamette river at that point and we  
see no reason why the bridge should  
not be built at once."

OREGON CITY LOCKS.—Captain

while there that the locks will proba-  
bly be in position for traffic inside  
of five days, all depending on the

HITS THE NAIL SQUARELY.—The  
Albany Democrat recently gave  
expression to its hope by saying  
that there was a probability of "a  
little war" in this county over the  
matter of bridges, consequent up-  
on the desire of Jefferson to have  
one built across the Santiam. The  
Jefferson Review answers the Dem-  
ocrat this week in a very fair and  
dignified article, requesting that  
paper not to be alarmed; that no  
war is imminent; "that the good  
people of Salem, and Marion county  
will do their share toward building  
a bridge here, even if they have suf-  
fered losses, that at first thought  
seem irreparable." The Review  
then continues the discussion in the  
same line followed by the CAPITAL  
JOURNAL and administers the sub-  
joined dose of solid facts to the  
Albany man: The people of Salem  
know the benefit of a bridge too  
well to deny the fact that Jefferson  
needs a bridge, and needs it badly;  
therefore, they are willing that  
other parts of the county should  
have their share, and do not expect  
everything to be done at Salem.  
Salem, it is true, deserves great  
credit for using every effort to  
have the big bridge replaced and  
we will be glad to note the comple-  
tion of it. It is true, also,  
that the Jefferson bridge has a warm  
friend in Salem, from the very fact,  
that any public improvement in  
Marion county increases the value  
of property therein, and every in-  
crease of value in Marion county, is  
a great benefit to Salem. The stick-  
ing point is with the Lincon county  
court, with her "comparatively  
small losses" and if she will come  
up and do the fair thing by Syna-  
cuse precinct there will be a bridge  
across the Santiam, at Jefferson, be-  
fore January first 1891. There is no  
doubt but what Albany would be a  
large gainer by the bridge here,  
more so than Salem, from the fact  
that Albany is but nine miles away,  
and Salem eighteen.
