Pendleton Tribune: The victory achieved by Chicago over New York in the matter of the location for the World's fair, on Monday, is one which makes an epoch in the history of the west. THE OREGONIAN OFF.

The Portland "Oregonian" opposes the use of tobacco bitterly, but always misrepresents temperance people. It says, March 1st:

Iowa republicans, who switched off on the prohibition track in third-party coaches, and gave the state to the democrats at the last election, have been given an early opportunity to see what egregious fools, politically speaking, they have made of themselves.

The facts do not sustain the Oregonian. The Iowa republicans never had anything in common politically with the third party. The third party has never supported the republican party in Iowa, but each year bitterly opposes it.

Prohibition was enacted in Iowa because the people at a nonpartisan election amended the constitution, by 30,000 majority, and demanded the abolition of the manufacture and sale of intoxicating beverages at three elections succeeding.

The late state election went republican by 4000 plurality on all but governor. The republican candidate did not receive the full support of the Farmers' Alliances, while all the railroad companies but one cast every vote they could for Boies, the democratic candidate, who has all his life been a corporate attorney.

The third party vote in Iowa in 1889 was just about large enough to secure the election of the democratic candidate for governor. Iowa has not repealed prohibition and probably never will.

Albany Democrat: On one occasion recently, when Marshal Charlton was enforcing the dog tax law, "Breyman's" master informed him that he was not wearing the regulation tag on his collar and that death was the penalty. The animal then inquired, in his most intelligent way, what he should do. AT THE FIRST METHODIST.

The Sunday Morning Services to a Large Audience.

The choir sang "How Lovely is Zion," with obligato solo by Miss Parrish. All read the morning lesson responsively from the 50th Psalm, and the pastor read Matthew 25, 31.
