YOUTHFUL PRIZE FIGHT.

The Big Five Add a New Feature to Their Program—A Little Wholesome Advice.

The "Big Five," whose initial minstrel performance was noted in these columns a week ago, have now added a new feature to their program which will not be looked upon with quite so much favor as their jollities in burnt cork. Their improvised "opera house," Sappingfield's barn, near the corner of Front and Division streets, was last evening the scene of a regular bare knuckle prize fight, according to the Marquis of Knockdown's rules, between two kids about sixteen or seventeen years old, in which one of the lads came off with his hands skinned and bleeding in regulation style.

The "fight" is said to have been arranged beforehand under proper articles of agreement, and was for a purse of \$7.50 raised by the "club." It was witnessed by a large crowd of boys ranging from 12 to 18 years old and was looked upon as the finest kind of amusement. There was no ill will between the contestants, the combat being entirely for "honors" and the purse.

The boys who are leaders in the "Big Five" movement are all of good families, are not vicious or unmanly, and their ideas to start with were to have fun and what they believe harmless enjoyment, hence the names of those engaged in the pugilistic exhibition will not be given this time, but the JOURNAL will in all kindness advise them to stop with the beginning every form of exercise that is in any manner disgraceful, and there can be none more so than fighting. It may be argued that the fight was a friendly one, but this quality cannot long characterize such encounters.

While the art of self defense, for muscular development, for facility of physical action and for use in an emergency is in every way honorable and useful, yet professional fighting is a brutal practice, followed only by the order of humanity in which the animal nature is abnormally developed, and is beneath the manhood, dignity and honor of decent and intellectual men.

Have all the fun you can, boys; sharpen your wits and your powers of impersonation to the full extent; develop your muscles by healthful exercise on the turning bar, with the dumb bells, with soft gloves, by running, jumping, and so forth, but do not practice or countenance those brutal exercises which you know would shame your mothers and sisters. Let your actions be such as will challenge the admiration and approbation of those whose respect you value and court.

LATER.—Since writing the above, the JOURNAL learns that there did exist bad blood between the two boys, engendered by the affections of both having been centered on the same girl, and they took this means of settling their respective claims, under the auspices of the "Big Five." The North Salem kid carried off the "honors," the purse, and now, of course the girl will be his, while the East Salem chap carried off black eyes and a mashed hand, and feelings of dire revenge lurking in his "manly" bosom. Oh lads, you ought to be ashamed of yourselves.
