THE JOURNAL learns that Hon.
W. H. Holmes, present clerk of the
supreme court, is being brought
to the quiet to be put in a position to
have a voice in the selection of his

deeming feature of the cheap plan.
But where two counties are inter-
ested why not double the sum? It

to every property holder in both
counties for all time to come?

not be sustained by the public itself,
but it is the only ideal that is satis-
factory to work from. We shall
aim to give a fair hearing to both
sides in local matters. We believe
there is but one right side where a
matter of principle is involved, but
that does not prevent a paper being
fair.

The Mortgage Tax Law.
C. C. Hogue in Corvallis Times
March 4: Under the present law
John Doe, of Benton county, bor-
rows \$2000 on mortgage from Rich-
ard Roe of New York City. If the
law is abrogated the assessment
rolls are reduced in the sum of \$2000
by the debt exemption clause of the
law. It is not pretended that the
mortgage tax law taxes the lender,
for he neither raises the rate of in-
terest charged, or specifies that the
borrower shall pay the tax. So that
the mortgage tax law has resolved
itself into a remedy for one of the
evils of the exemption for debt law.
I say one, for there are others. Sup-
pose Thomas Jones of Benton, bor-
rows \$2000 of Harry Smith of Mult-
nomah on personal security. Jones
owns land worth \$6000 assessed as
usual at one-third of its value or \$2000,
he deducts his indebtedness and
pays no tax in this county. The
fact that Harry Smith pays tax on
\$2000 in Multnomah cuts no figure
for if he owned that much land in
Benton he would pay taxes on it in
Benton.

Another failing of the deduction
law grows out of the above state of
facts. A man owning land is better
off in debt than out. For instance,
Thomas Jones above named, has
\$4000 worth of land all paid for. He
would pay about three per cent on
the assessed amount or one per cent
on the real value. He borrows
\$2000 and buys more land to that
amount and now pays no tax, sav-
ing thereby two per cent. on the
amount he borrows.

As the repeal of the deduction law
will cure the evils mentioned by Mr.
Skilton as reached by the mortgage
tax law, will he or some one else
show us why both these laws should
not be repealed? I believe that was
the course recommended by the As-
sessor's convention and not the
simple report of the mortgage tax
law as Mr. Skilton thinks. Not
having the article in the Oregonian
to which he refers before me, I speak
of it from memory and may be mis-
taken.

THE SILVER QUESTION.

An Able Review From a Prominent
Citiz n and Member of the
State Grange.

The Statesman in following the
lead of the Oregonian is afraid of
"bimetallism, or the double stand-
ard" of money. It says, "gold be-
ing the more staple the price of the
two metals does not always rise and
fall together, and their relative
value is subject to constant change."

They will neither rise or fall when
the price of each is fixed by law,
and an unlimited market provided
at the mint; which will be the case
when free coinage shall be provided
for silver.

The mono-metallists claim that
free coinage will give us too much
money. This is the fear proclaimed
by the Oregonian, the organ of the
banks and bondholders of Portland,
and echoed by the Statesman.

To show that this fear is illusory
it is only necessary to state just one
fact—and that is, that statistics show
that the gold and silver in the
civilized world, not now coined or
used in the arts, were coined into
money, it would not furnish suffi-
cient circulating medium to meet
the demands of trade and com-
merce.

Let those who understand this
important matter speak, and statis-
tics will refute the naked assertions
of the agents of the money kings.
The San Diego says:

"The very unwise legislation on
the part of our government in 1873
in regard to silver enabled British
India to import over \$750,000,000 in
values of silver at a greatly reduced
price, and thereby increase the
volume of her money immensely,
which aided her in building up her
industries to immense proportions.
India, between March 31, 1885, and
March 31, 1889, imported net of silver
about \$182,000,000, making a profit
thereon between the commercial
and coinage values of over \$50,000,-
000. This fearful loss was sustained
by the people of the United States,
Mexico, Bolivia, Chili and Peru,
who produce most all silver. India
in 1887 and 1888 coined (not includ-
ing recoinage) silver to the value of
over \$77,000,000. Thus it can be
seen how the United States has aid-
ed India in building up her thriv-
ing commerce. India in 1877 ship-
ped no wheat to Europe. Now she
controls the European market. In
1879 India only manufactured 260,-
000 bales of cotton. Last year she
manufactured 850,000 bales.

During 1887 and 1888 Japan coined
silver to the value of \$20,000,000.
Every steamer leaving San Fran-
cisco for Hong Kong carries away
from \$500,000 to \$1,500,000 in silver,
paid for at its commercial value in-
stead of its coinage value. Thus
our people are robbed for the benefit
of the Asiatics. China is now, just
completing at Canton, one of the
largest mints of the world, with the
most elaborate machinery for the
coinage of silver, to aid in substi-
tuting a convenient money for its
very cumbersome and burdensome
circulation. The commerce of the
Asiatics is now in its merest infancy,
but it is having a wonderful rapid
and large growth. They are now
capable of absorbing at least \$100,-
000,000 per annum, say about ten
cents per capita. In a few years the
product of the world will hardly be
sufficient to supply their demand for
silver and they will be forced to
take gold.

"During 1888 the coinage value of
the silver product of the world was
about \$142,000,000, of which al-
most \$122,000,000 was coined, not
including recoinage, and about \$20,-
000,000 went into the arts, thus leav-
ing no surplus. That year the
United States coined about \$33,000,-
000. Had the maximum of the law of
1873 been coined there would have
been coined about \$54,000,000, and
there would have been a deficit of
\$21,000,000 in the requirements of
the world for coinage and manu-
facture. The silver bullion would
have commended its full coinage
and our people, as our neighbors,
been immeasurably benefited thereby."

The New York Tribune says:
Why is it that he called the "bet-
ter met?"

The unlimited use of silver would
not inflate the world's money, be-
cause all the silver now produced is
either coined or absorbed in the arts.
The amount of gold and silver coin
in the world is less than \$3,000,000,-
000, and is an insufficient supply of
money. This is shown by the fact
that \$1,000,000,000 of paper is in
actual circulation in addition to the
coin of both metals. No nation of
modern times has been able to ob-
tain enough of either metal or of
the two combined to supply the de-
mand for money. Every civilized
country supplements its gold and
silver with paper money. There is
no reasonable prospect that any
country ever will in the future reach
a metallic basis, dollar for dollar,
even by the use of both gold and
silver. So long as the world is com-
pelled to resort to paper money to

make up the deficient supply of
metallic money there is no danger
of the acquisition of too much silver.

Those who have debts to pay,
many of which were contracted be-
fore contraction of the currency
took place, are deeply interested in
having more money. So likewise
are the people who are being taxed
to pay the bonded indebtedness of
the United States and the states,
which were contracted when wheat
was one dollar and thirty-three
cents per bushel. Now it takes
more than two bushels to pay what
one would pay then. But while
the shrinkage in produce has been
more than half, there has been no
shrinkage in bonds and mortgages.
The Shylocks can still demand the
"pound of flesh."

At the First Methodist Church.

There was more than the custom-
ary audience, that so strongly sus-
tains Rev. Rollins at the First M.
E. church, present on Sunday morn-
ing to hear his discourse on "Ghouls
and Carrion Crows." The 35th
Psalm was read responsively, and
the pastor said it would be well if
all his hearers would commit it to
memory.

There was an unusual attendance
of young men and women from the
University and Woman's college.
The text chosen was I Cor. 13,
7th verse, Charity. This brief
chapter delineated all the fruits of
a Christian life. No other few
words of English was packed so full
of meanings. Here was depicted the
one thing without which Christian
life was an empty experience—real
Christian love for our fellow man.
The man who could live out the
words of this text was fit for the
world or any other. All accomplish-
ments were useful, but the talent of
real love for humanity, that enabled
a man to reach down farthest to
uplift his fellow man, this surpassed
all others. All great abilities in
achieving the successes of life were
incomparable to a heart filled with
love and unselfishness. Yet this
best thing of all was free to all.
God's best things could not be cor-
nered by the selfish of earth. The
unloving man or woman—that is,
the uncharitable man or woman—
the person devoid of the passion or
power of love, incapable of suffer-
ing and bearing for others, cannot
accomplish much in this world
even.

Suffering was not new to any of
us. What effect had it upon us?
Our loved ones, our wealth, our
health, may have flown away. Man's
inhumanity to man may have
chastened us. We may have been
cast down, that thereby another
has raised himself up. Through a
thousand avenues suffering comes
to us. Do we profit by it? Have we
learned the lesson God would teach
us through suffering, the Christlike
patience?

Charity believes all things. This
may seem to be a contradictory pas-
sage. This is love's power of moral
optimism. This does not mean that
we shall lay aside all our powers of
moral discrimination. It means that
until convinced beyond doubt that
our fellowman or woman is wrong,
we have no right as Christians to
take up an unfilled rumor and on
the strength of that turn our backs
on a fellow being. It is time enough
when the clouds of calumny or ob-
loquy have been established for us
to join the heartless world that is al-
ways ready to blacken and destroy
the character of a Christian. The
man of low moral character is
always ready to drag down every
man whose life is a rebuke to his un-
godliness.

Yet how small is our charity!
Twenty years of upright, honorable,
godly life passes unnoticed, but one
indiscretion, one misstep, is heralded
to the world by type and telegraph.
The leech upon society feeds and
fattens on rumors and scandals and
exists by probing its bill into the
sore-spots and reveling in putridity.

We may expect too much of a
man. We may hope for a stand-
ard of ideals that our friend will
never attain. But was not this
better than to underestimate him,
as the pessimist does? Our religion
is one of hope as well as love. We
expect the best. We hope for per-
fection.

Love and charity endureth all
things. Here is the line of demar-
cation between spiritual and sensual
love. The latter is short-lived. Let
its object be marred by time, dis-
ease or accident and it is cast aside.
Spiritual love would hold as true to
its object as God does to humanity.
Without it we are lost for the pre-
sent and for eternity.
