FREE RAW SUGAR.

THE JOURNAL is happy to find
that what it has advocated is to be
adopted by congress. The republi-
cans of the Ways and Means com-
mittee of the house have decided to
admit raw sugar free of duty and
offer a bounty for the production of
domestic sugar. The high tariff on
sugar, although retained for many
years with the idea of encouraging
the production of sugar in the United
States, never accomplished that ob-
ject. Statistics show that our pro-
duction of sugar is smaller to-day
than several years ago. Under the
circumstances the abandonment of
the duty is in line with advanced
protective ideas. If the recommen-
dation of the committee prevails in
the house, and raw sugar is admit-
ted free, there will be such a heavy
reduction in the revenue that all
apprehension of a dangerous surplus
will be removed. The removal of
the duty would also add another
link to the evidence that the republi-
can party is the only party that
reduces taxation, for it
must always be borne in mind
that the democrats, although they
have controlled the house through
five different congresses, have done
nothing but promise reductions.

Some fine specimens of gold have
been brought in from the diggings
in all parts of Southern Oregon since
the washout by the floods. General
Reames exhibited at the Jackson-
ville bank recently a piece of gold

A Card From Mr. Jackson.

DEAR SIR: In your issue of the
7th inst. I read a short article of

The Roads." Said article refers to
work being done under my super-
vision on the highway leading from
Salem to Brooks, and was published
(I suppose) by the urgency of the
gentleman learning the pseudonym
of "Parties." If I am not mistaken
in the identity of this man "Parties,"
the condition of the road ditch
adjacent his fence, is a touching re-
minder of the gentleman's tender
solicitude for the welfare of the road.
I have not discussed road making
with "Parties," hence I do not
know to what school of builders he
belongs, but he does not im-
press me that he is a disciple of
Mac Adam. If I were called upon
to assign him a place on the list of
road architects, I should certainly
class him with the easy going non-
progressives who are satisfied with
depressed road-beds and elevated
ditches; such are the distinguish-
ing features of the road in question.
"Parties" must understand that this
is a new regime; we propose to in-
fuse a little dignity and aspiration in
this old depressed road-bed, and raise
it above the level of a common ditch.
Of course, we expect curses for our
hire; the wide awake supervisor
looks for his blessings to come
through posthumous channels. We
propose to be supervisor for this year,
unless sooner deposed; and happily
for all concerned, the power that
creates, is the same that deposes,
and the law prescribes the modus
operandi. Nothing in these presents
shall be construed that we are ad-
verse to taking advice, but we must
be allowed to reject such as we can
use. "Parties" wishing rejected ad-
vice returned will please enclose a
stamp. Some advice is very good,
we were partly brought up on ad-
vice; but when a friend sends us a
budget advising us to defer plowing
a road that has been trodden for forty
years by pilgrims from every clime,
and from every state in our Union
(including Missouri), until the sultry
days of Summer, we label the pack-

cent desuetude." I commission

that no dirt will be scraped into the
center of the road until terra firma
becomes dusty; but the plowing of
the sides will continue while the

FARM AND HOME.

A New York dairyman, after
much persuasion, was induced to
keep a milk-record of each cow;
and, on summing up, found that
only one cow in three was paying
expenses. Thereupon he "reorgan-
ized" that herd in a hurry, and is
now satisfied that a record is a safe
thing.

Advices from Mobile, Ala., say
freezing weather has entirely de-
stroyed early vegetables. All the
peas, beans, squash, tomato and
Irish potato vines have been killed.
Cabbage is damaged 25 per cent.
The loss to Mobile county alone is
placed at \$100,000.

Plowing and seeding land by
steam, heading and threshing grain
and hauling it to market by the
same means, promises to so reduce
the cost of raising wheat and barley
in this state as to practically drive
small farmers out of the grain pro-
ducing business. Better be getting
an orchard or vineyard started.—
Fresno Republican.

It is what a man has left at the

consider myself sufficiently primed
with agricultural lore to tell a Short-
horn from a S-A blanket."

Canada uses 4,000,000 lbs. of dress-
ed beef per annum imported from
the United States. The Dominion
government proposes to put on such
a tariff as to prohibit its importation,
as its introduction is disastrous to
the Canadian farmer.

Exports from the United States
for the twelve months ending Janu-
ary 31 reached the magnificent ag-
gregate of \$28,890,526, being an in-
crease year of nearly \$125,750,000,
and a total which has never even
approached since 1881 to 1882, when
the aggregate value was within
about \$5,000,000 of the present figure.
The result is that the outside world
owes us an apparent trade balance
on the operations of these twelve
months of \$122,389,382, or over \$117.

600,000 more than the balance for
the previous corresponding period.

The dairy commissioner of Wis-
consin is reported as saying that
Wisconsin people who used to throw
away fodder in winter have been
taught by droughts of late years to
take off their hats to corn-stalk or
straw-stalk. Adversity proves a
blessing in disguise.

The Union Central Committee
have issued a call for a state Union
Convention, to be held at Oregon
City, Wednesday, April 9, 10 a. m.,
to adopt a state platform and nomi-
nate state officers, to be voted for
at the next state election.

The farmers of Belleville, Illinois,
adopted the following:

Resolved, That we earnestly peti-
tion our representatives in congress
to work and vote against the Win-
d-m bill and for a bill favoring the
re-coinage of silver and the free
and unlimited coinage of the silver
dollar of 412 grains, nine-tenths
fine, upon the same terms and con-
ditions as gold and equal with gold
in legal tender quality, and pend-
ing the interval before such act of
congress, the secretary of the treas-
ury be instructed to purchase the
maximum amount of silver author-
ized by the Bland act, \$4,000,000 per
month, and have the same coined
into silver dollars.

Here is the way that Ingersoll ex-
plains the situation: Here is a shoe
shop. One of the men is always
busy during the day. In the evening
he goes courting some nice girl.
There are five other men that don't
do any such thing. They spend
half their working evenings in dis-
sipation. The first young man by
and bye cuts out those and gets a
boot and shoe store of his own.
Then he marries and is able to take
his wife out riding. The five former
companions, who see him indulg-
ing in his luxury, retire to a saloon
and resolve that there is an eternal
struggle between labor and capital."

Speaking of the effect of the Iowa
prohibitory law, Governor Larnabee
says: The report of the secretary of
state relating to criminal convictions
shows that during the twenty-two
months ending July 31, 1889, there
were 1945 convictions for crime, of
which 755 were for felony, and 672
for violation of the prohibitory law.
Of those convicted 514 were sent to
the penitentiary. During the pre-
ceding period of two years the to-
tal number of convictions was 3155
of which those for felony numbered
874, and those for violation of the
prohibitory law 1328; while the num-
ber receiving penitentiary sentence
was 636. This indication of the de-
crease of crime cannot but be grati-
fying to all who have at heart the
welfare of the state.
