VETERANS IN CLOVER.

G. A. R. Men Royally Treated in Eugene—Salem Not the Next Meeting Place.

One of the old veteran friends of the JOURNAL in attendance at the department encampment of the G. A. R. and W. R. C. at Eugene, sends the following interesting account of the affair up to 11 o'clock last night: The encampment of the G. A. R., department of Oregon, was called to order at 3 o'clock p. m. to-day, by Department Commander McElroy.

The business of the department headquarters is well in hand, and started off in good shape. Department Commander McElroy presented his report, which was a well prepared document, and gives much information about the condition of the department, from which it is found that the members have largely increased in the past year, and that the financial condition is on a good basis.
