The Portland World, in its efforts to

politics that disgrace the scramble
for office now commencing with en-
ergy among the devotees of that

for a third term as superintendent
of public instruction. He says

be charging him with a want of po-
litical sagacity and good sense

eight years, during which the re-
publican party of Oregon experi-
enced more or less disaster, are suf-
ficient to show that democracy can
take little pleasure in seeing McEl-
roy's name on the republican ticket.
Prof. McElroy has been a good
and reliable worker for republican
principles on the battle field, at the
polls, and in public office, and
whether nominated again or not
will be found doing his level best
to carry those principles to trium-
phant success.

The Lottery Swindle.

ED. CAPITAL JOURNAL:—The peo-

Some say these laws cannot be en-
forced, because the officers who
execute the laws and the judges who

word, or other learned reason why
the culprit should go free, and the
laws themselves then become dead
letters and breeders of evil instead
of good. Oregon has a stringent
law, prohibiting newspapers from
publishing this class of advertise-
ments and yet it is said that
several newspapers in the state
have continued these advertisements
right along from month to month
and no officer has ever seen, or heard
of them! If a complaint is filed a
defective bill is easily made and the
culprit snags his fingers at the judge
and jury, pockets his coin for the
advertisement that entices hundreds
of boys to send off the money that
gives this corrupt company its power
to reach out wider and wider and
suborn judges and juries, law makers
and law executors as well as ruin
the homes and corrupt the morals
of thousands and thousands of
united families in the land. Then
I repeat it. "Let all good men stand
by Governor Nichols" and condemn
every agency that loans or hires

itself to this or any like association
for the lowering of American citi-

FROM WOODBURN.

To speak of Woodburn as it surely
deserves, would be a hard matter.
The town is certainly just on the
verge of a substantial growth.
Woodburn proper is a flourishing
city on the line of the Southern Pa-
cific railroad and also on the east
side of the Oregonian railway, and
is just 17 miles northeast of Sa-
lem, the county seat of Marion
county and the state capital. For
the past year the town has taken on
city airs, and a number of elegant
residences now are noted over the
city. The city is growing very rap-
idly and an iron foundry, machine
shop, grist mill, a cannery, and grain
warehouses are among the enter-
prising pursuits of the city, and sup-
port many employes. Several addi-
tions to the town are being laid out

40 new residences will be con-
structed the coming spring and sum-

newspaper, the Independent, Chris-
tian and Presbyterian churches, and
strong talk of water works. The
citizens are enterprising and always
ready and willing to aid a new-
comer. Business of all branches is
represented here.

Frank A. Ford is the postmaster,
with O. A. Bourret as assistant.
The city is supplied with two
meat markets, D. Boyer being
owner of one and M. Batrow of the
other. Each shop carries a nice line
of meats, fish, etc.

The Woodburn Packing company do
an immense business. They are
large dealers in all kinds of fruits
and produce and also carry on a
large general store.

The furniture business is repre-
sented by Wm. Fash.

The city livery and sale stable is
owned by Wm. H. Goulet. The
stable is first-class in every respect
and good transportation is furnished
the traveling public.

J. S. Leonard is one of the enter-
prising business men of the city.
He carries a good stock of groceries
and clothing. He makes a specialty
of the celebrated Brownsville cloth-
ing.

The drug business of the city is
well represented. Good stocks are
carried and careful and competent
druggists employed.

The nursery business is an impor-
tant factor around the city and sev-
eral large nurseries are in full oper-
ation.

Walter L. Toozie is one of the busi-
ness men that Woodburn should be
justly proud of. Mr. Toozie got his
start in life by teaching school, and
as soon as he was able he launched
out in the mercantile business, and
to-day is proprietor of a large and
well established business after four
years from the time he started out.
He now owns a general merchandise
store, carrying everything usually
carried in such a store, and also is a
large grain dealer. His merchandise
sales last year footed up over \$20,000
and he handled over 100,000 bushels
of grain. He is justly called the
"King of the Prairie."

For curing hams we will give you
the old Knickerbocker receipt, which
is now used in this section, and if
followed will give you hams ex-
ceeded by none. For 100 lbs meat
take 9 lbs. e. f. salt, 3 oz. saltpetre, 3
lbs molasses sugar, 1 oz. bicarbonate
of soda, and six gallons of water.
Mix, and when dissolved pour over
the meat. Let the meat remain in
the pickle for six weeks; remove;
smoke to suit.

The Cos Bay News says: When
the wool market is active and dis-
criminating, Douglas county, (Um-
qua valley) wool is most eagerly
bought, sometimes rating three
cents per pound higher than that of
the Willamette valley. This is
caused mainly by the fact that wool
growing is pursued more as a busi-
ness and the district received a
larger portion of Merino blood upon
its first introduction into Oregon
and has kept most steadily in that
line of breeding ever since.
